The Statewide Primary Election will be held on Tuesday, June 2, 2026. Polls will be open 7:00 am to 8:00 pm on Election Day.  **Go Green** – You may now “Opt Out” of receiving a paper Voter Information Pamphlet. There is an “Opt Out” form in this Pamphlet or you can visit the Elections Department website at <https://www.eldoradocounty.ca.gov/Elections> and click on the link next to the green leaf.  You’ll receive an email prior to every election letting you know your Voter Information Pamphlet is available online. If you change your mind, you can always opt back in. It’s a simple way to Go Green.

 **Electronic Ballots for Military and Overseas Voters** – Active-duty members of the Military, their dependents, and U.S. citizens residing overseas can now access their ballot electronically anywhere in the world. These ballots are sent 45 days before the election. Visit our website at <https://www.eldoradocounty.ca.gov/County-Elections/Accessible-Voting>. If you know someone in the Military or Overseas, please tell them about this new service.

 **Vote by Mail** - All registered voters will receive a ballot in the mail. All Vote by Mail ballots are verified to ensure “One Person – One Vote” before they are counted; and if returned **before** Election Day they are included in the first results posted after the polls close. Vote by Mail ballots may be returned to any Vote Center or Drop Box in the County or placed into the mail, if returning by mail please ensure your envelope is post marked by Election Day, and received within 7 days of the election.

We look forward to counting your ballot, and thank you for participating.

Vote by Mail

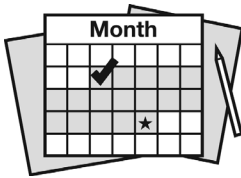
All registered voters will receive a ballot in the mail. Ballots will be mailed on **May 4, 2026**.

* Be sure to **SIGN** the return envelope.

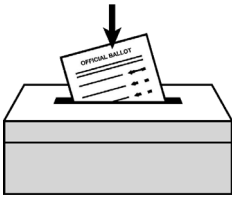

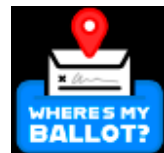

Accessible Voting

At the Vote Center:

All Vote Centers are ADA accessible with temporary thresholds or ramps, if needed.

Accessible Voting System:

Each Vote Center has at least three accessible ballot marking devices that offer:



- An audio option that reads the ballot to you
- A handheld tactile device with a universal plug for a personal assistive device
- Large text size with three viewing versions
- Spanish language ballot if you choose

Curbside Voting:

Voters may also visit any Vote Center and ask for curbside voting assistance.

Remote Accessible Vote by Mail Ballot (RAVBM) Assistance:

RAVBM allows voters to mark their selections using their own compatible technology to vote independently and privately in the comfort of their own home. You must have a printer to complete an RAVBM ballot.

How to request an RAVBM ballot:

- ✓ First, the voter must be registered in El Dorado County. You can check your voter status at: **voterstatus.sos.ca.gov**. You can select to receive an RAVBM ballot on your voter status page from 29 days before the election through 4 p.m. on election day, or
- ✓ Second, go to our website: **www.eldoradocounty.ca.gov/County-Government/Elections/Accessible-Voting**. Complete the online form and submit it according to the directions on the form and mail the wet signature back to us at the address provided on the form.
 1. You will receive an email with a link to your ballot.
 2. Mark your selections.
 3. Download the balloting materials.
 4. Print your ballot.
 5. Sign the Declaration & Oath of Voter (this is the bottom section on the instructions to voter page).
 6. Return the printed and signed Declaration & Oath, along with the marked ballot, either by mail or by dropping it off at a vote center location or ballot drop box.

Note: The ballot cannot be returned electronically.



Language Needs Information

NOTICE TO VOTERS WITH LIMITED ENGLISH PROFICIENCY:

LanguageLine Solutions is our partner to eliminate any language barrier, including American Sign Language. Through them we have nearly instant access to trained video interpreters through a high-quality video application. This will help to reduce your frustration, make the interaction more efficient so you can get through your voting experience easier, and provide outstanding service to our limited English proficient, (LEP) and Deaf and Hard-of-Hearing customers.

NOTE: The electronic Ballot Marking devices at each Vote Center will also have Spanish as an available option or you may request a Spanish paper ballot.

All Vote Centers will offer a Spanish ballot. To request to have one sent to you before Election Day, please call our office at (530) 621-7480. Requests must be received no later than 7 days before Election Day.

If you need assistance when voting, you may bring up to two people with you to your polling place, as long as they are not representatives of your employer or your union. Bring a family member or friend!

Who is on the ballot in a Primary Election?

What is a Top Two Primary?

A Top Two Primary lets you vote for any candidate (for most races), even if you are not in the same political party. The top two candidates – the ones who get the most votes in the primary – will be on the General Election ballot in November. It became law in 2010 when the voters passed Proposition 14 for only the top two candidates to make it on the General Election ballot for most races – the ones who get the most votes in the primary – no matter what party they are affiliated with.

What does party preference mean?

Party preference refers to the political party you – or the candidate – is registered with. It's listed next to each candidate's name on the ballot. Nothing appears for candidates who are not registered with a party.

Do all offices follow the Top Two Rules?

No. The Top Two does not apply to elections for President, Party Central Committees, or County Councils.

Can the Top Two candidates be from the same party?

Yes. The Top Two candidates receiving the highest and second-highest number of votes might be from the same party, different parties, or no party. The Top Two candidates will appear on the General Election ballot.

Do I need to register again for each election?

No. Fill out a new Voter Registration card only if you have moved, changed your name, or want to change your party affiliation. You may register to vote on-line at registertovote.ca.gov. If you have any questions regarding your voter registration or the Top Two Primary, please call our office at (530) 621-7480.

Prop. 34 – Expenditure Limitations: State Legislative Candidates

Proposition 34 was passed by voters in November 2000. The law requires county election officials to provide the names of those State Legislative candidates who have voluntarily agreed to expenditure limits. Candidates who agree to the expenditure limits may submit and pay for a Candidate's Statement of Qualification to be printed in this pamphlet. The following State Legislative candidates appearing on ballots in El Dorado County have accepted the voluntary expenditure limitations pursuant to Proposition 34.

Party Endorsement

ELECTION CODE 13302(b). In connection with an election at which a candidate for a voter-nominated office will appear on the ballot, a qualified political party may submit to the county elections official a list of all candidates for voter-nominated office who will appear on a ballot in the county in question, and who have been endorsed by the party by whatever lawful mechanism the party adopts for endorsing candidates for voter-nominated office. If a political party timely submits a list to the county elections official pursuant to this subdivision, the county elections official shall print the names of the candidates for voter-nominated office who were endorsed by that political party in the voter information portion of the county voter information guide. The party chairperson shall provide a written copy of the list of candidates endorsed by the party not later than 83 days before the election at which the candidate for a voter-nominated office will appear on the ballot. *(Amended by Stats. 2016, Ch. 3, Sec. 43. Effective January 1, 2017.)*

SETTING FOR ELECTION A MEASURE PROPOSING A RENEWAL OF THE EXISTING LIBRARY SPECIAL TAX IN THE SOUTH LAKE TAHOE LIBRARY ZONE OF BENEFIT (ZONE F) WITHIN COUNTY SERVICE AREA NO. 10

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors has previously established the authority for County Service Area No. 10 to provide library services and facilities, and did, on August 1, 1995 establish the South Lake Tahoe Zone of Benefit (Zone F) within County Service Area No. 10 for the purpose of delivering such library services and facilities, and

WHEREAS, Government Code section 25213(d) expressly authorizes a county service area to provide library services and facilities, and

WHEREAS, Government Code section 25215.2 expressly authorizes the Board of Supervisors to levy special taxes to fund the costs of operating and maintaining authorized services and facilities within a county service area subject to voter approval, and

WHEREAS, Government Code section 53717 also expressly authorizes a county to levy special taxes to provide public library facilities and services, and

If approved by the voters, the measure would renew the library parcel tax that is due to expire on June 30, 2027 for twenty (20) years in the amount of \$25.50 per parcel per year beginning July 1, 2027 to fund library facilities and services within Zone F.
2. The library special tax is a flat parcel tax and shall apply uniformly to all parcels of real property. "Parcel of real property" shall mean any improved or unimproved land that is wholly or partially located within the South Lake Tahoe Library Zone of Benefit (Zone F) in County Service Area No. 10 and includes a timeshare estate for which the right to occupy the timeshare estate is divided into specified periods of time on a periodic basis that is legally transferrable.

3. The tax imposed by this Resolution shall appear as a separate item on the property tax bill parcel and collected at the same time and manner as county ad valorem property taxes are collected as set forth in the applicable provisions of the Revenue and Taxation Code and shall be subject to the same penalties and the same procedure and sale in case of delinquency as provided for such taxes. All laws applicable to the levy, collection, and enforcement of county property taxes shall be applicable to such tax.
4. The special tax shall be increased annually in proportion to the increase in the Consumer Price Index (CPI), San Francisco Area, all items, most recently available prior to the date of the annual increase, provided, however, the annual increase shall not exceed three percent (3%) in any year.
5. The special tax amount shown on Exhibit A shall take effect and be imposed only if it is approved by a two-thirds vote of the votes cast on the measure.
6. Upon approval of the special tax described herein, there shall be created an account into which proceeds of the tax shall be deposited. The existing special tax in the Zone was approved by voters in 2014 and is scheduled to expire on June 30, 2027. The special tax rate will be subject to an annual inflationary adjustment in proportion to the increase in the Consumer Price Index, San Francisco Area, in an amount not to exceed three percent (3%) in any given year. The special tax authorized by this Measure is expected to generate total revenue of approximately \$124,000 per year. The special tax proposed by this Measure will be used only to provide library services and facilities within the Zone.

State law requires the proceeds from the special tax be applied only to the identified purposes and that an annual report be made indicating the amount of funds collected and expended and the status of any project required or authorized to be funded by the proceeds. The special tax authorized by this Measure will be listed as a separate item on the county property tax bill for each affected parcel of land and will be collected in the same manner as the general property tax. All laws applicable to the levy, collection, and enforcement of county property taxes, including the provisions for penalties and the procedures for sale of the property in case of delinquency, shall also apply to the special tax.

A "yes" vote is a vote to authorize the extension of the existing special tax for an additional twenty years.

A "no" vote is a vote against the extension of the existing special tax, in which case it will expire by its own terms.

FULL TEXT OF MEASURE E

RESOLUTION 2025-14 RESOLUTION TO SUBMIT TO THE VOTERS RENEWAL OF THE EXISTING FIRE SPECIAL TAX

WHEREAS, the Fallen Leaf Lake Community Services District ("District") is a Community Services District organized and existing pursuant to Government Code section 61000 and following; and

WHEREAS, the District through its voters on June 22, 2018, approved a Fire Special Tax for properties within the District's boundaries; and

WHEREAS, the District through its voters on June 7, 2022, approved a four extension of the Fire Special Tax; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors of the District wish to submit to the voters for approval a renewal of that Fire Special Tax pursuant to Government Code section 54978; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors wish to eliminate the 'sunset' provision requiring voter approval of the Fire Tax every four years; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors wish to include an inflationary factor so that Fire Tax revenue increases in amount based on the annual Consumer Price Index;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that on behalf of the Fallen Leaf Lake Community Services District, the President of the Board is hereby authorized and shall request by submitting this Resolution to the Elections Department of the County of El Dorado, that the District's ballot measure below be consolidated with the statewide Primary Election on June 2, 2026 for the purpose of submitting to the voters of the District a ballot measure to extend the Fire Tax indefinitely and add an annual inflation factor based on the Consumer Price Index.

RESOLVED FURTHER, the Board acknowledges that the consolidated election will be held and conducted in the manner prescribed by California Elections Code section 10418.

RESOLVED FURTHER, that the Board hereby approves the following language for the ballot measure:

"To fund emergency medical and fire protection services, shall the measure renewing the existing Fire Special Tax, voter-approved on July 27, 2014 and extended on June 7, 2022, and set annually by the CSD Board, subject to an annual maximum inflation adjustment of the lesser of 1.5% per year or the U.S. Bureau of Labor's Consumer Price Index or any successor to that Index in the 12 months ending June 30th of the previous fiscal year, established as: Unimproved 0.5 unit (currently \$330.00); improved 1.0 unit (currently \$660); SSA Sierra Programs LLC (40 units), annual revenue raised of \$212,850, be adopted and extended until voters repeal or replace it?"

After consulting with legal counsel and the Board President, the following ballot question language has been approved by the Board President:

"To fund ambulance and fire protection, shall the measure renewing the Fire Special Tax, originally voter-approved on July 27, 2014, and set annually by the CSD Board, subject to a maximum inflation adjustment of the lesser of 1.5% per year or the U.S. Bureau of Labor's Consumer Price Index on June 30th of the previous fiscal year, established as: Unimproved 0.5 unit (\$330.00); improved 1.0 unit (\$660); SSA Sierra Programs LLC (40 units), annual revenue raised of \$212,800, be adopted and extended until repealed or replaced?"

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE E

Measure E (the “Measure”), if approved by two-thirds of the voters voting thereon, would extend until repealed an existing special tax in an amount not to exceed \$660 per unit within the Fallen Leaf Lake Community Services District. This Measure was placed on the ballot by the Board of Directors of the Fallen Leaf Lake Community Services District pursuant to District Resolution No. 2025-14.

The Fallen Leaf Lake Community Services District currently levies a special tax to fund emergency medical and fire protection services in an amount not to exceed \$660 per unit. That special tax is scheduled to expire by its own terms in 2026. If approved, this Measure would extend the special tax, which will then remain in effect until repealed or replaced by the voters. The special tax authorized by this Measure would be in the amount of \$660 per unit (subject to a maximum inflationary adjustment of the lesser of 1.5% per year or the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics Consumer Price Index) and be levied as follows: Unimproved Property – 0.5 unit; Improved Property – 1.0 unit; and SSA Sierra Programs LLC – 40 units. If the Measure fails, the existing special tax will expire by its own terms. The special tax authorized by this Measure will be used solely for the purpose of providing ambulance and fire protection services within the Fallen Leaf Lake Community Services District and is expected to generate annual revenue of \$212,800 per year.

State law requires the proceeds from the special tax be applied only to the identified purposes and that an annual report be made indicating the amount of funds collected and expended and the status of any project required or authorized to be funded by the proceeds. The special tax authorized by this Measure will be listed as a separate item on the county property tax bill for each affected parcel of land and will be collected in the same manner as the general property tax. All laws applicable to the levy, collection, and enforcement of county property taxes, including the provisions for penalties and the procedures for sale of the property in case of delinquency, shall also apply to the special tax.

A “yes” vote is a vote to authorize the extension of the existing special tax until repealed.

A “no” vote is a vote against the extension of the existing special tax, in which case it will expire by its own terms.

ARGUMENT IN FAVOR OF MEASURE E

The Fallen Leaf Lake Community Services District provides essential fire protection and emergency medical services to our community. These services are vital to protecting lives, homes, and the natural resources that define our beautiful basin.

The Special Fire Tax helps fund emergency response personnel, equipment, training and readiness. It is the Fire Department's primary source of predictable operating income and was first passed by voters over 20 years ago with a self-imposed cap of \$660 per developed parcel. Over time, rising costs for staffing, insurance, and emergency equipment have significantly outpaced fire department tax revenues.

The current funding level is no longer sufficient to sustain basic operations. Measure E removes the funding cap and increases the Special Fire Tax by *the lesser of* 1.5% or the Consumer Price Index each year.

Approval of Measure E will ensure the continued availability of local fire protection and emergency medical services, including rapid response to wildfires, medical emergencies, and natural disasters. These tax revenues provide an essential supplement to the District's highly variable strike team income. Both are necessary for the successful operation of our fire department.

Measure E represents a fiscally responsible investment in local public safety, emergency preparedness, and property protection. It preserves local control of critical services and helps ensure that trained responders and essential equipment remain available when emergencies occur. Without the Special Fire tax, the FLLFD would revert to a volunteer force.

Approval of Measure E preserves property values by ensuring that professional services are available when they are needed most and allows our community to directly support the services that protect us.

A vote in favor is a vote to safeguard our community, responsibly fund essential services, and ensure Fallen Leaf Lake remains a safe and resilient place to live for generations to come.

RESOLUTION NO. 2026-01 OF THE GOVERNING BOARD OF THE SOUTH LAKE TAHOE RECREATION FACILITIES JOINT POWERS AUTHORITY

A RESOLUTION CALLING AN ELECTION TO VOTE ON A PROPOSAL TO CHANGE THE RATE AND METHOD OF APPORTIONMENT OF SPECIAL TAX FOR COMMUNITY FACILITIES DISTRICT NO. 2000-1 OF THE SOUTH LAKE TAHOE RECREATION FACILITIES JOINT POWERS AUTHORITY INCLUDING TO EXTEND THE TERM OF THE SPECIAL TAX FOR THIRTY YEARS COMMENCING WITH FISCAL YEAR 2030-31, TO PROVIDE FOR ANNUAL INCREASES IN THE AMOUNT OF THE SPECIAL TAX, TO BE EFFECTIVE COMMENCING WITH FISCAL YEAR 2031-32, TO REVISE THE LIST OF FACILITIES, SERVICES AND INCIDENTAL EXPENSES TO BE FINANCED BY COMMUNITY FACILITIES DISTRICT NO. 2000-1 ON AND AFTER JULY 1, 2030, AND TO MAKE CERTAIN OTHER CHANGES TO THE ADMINISTRATION OF THE DISTRICT

WHEREAS, on December 18, 2025, the Board of Directors (the "Board") of the South Lake Tahoe Recreation Facilities Joint Powers Authority (the "Authority") adopted a Resolution entitled "A Resolution of Consideration to Change the Rate and Method of Apportionment of Special Tax for Community Facilities District No. 2000-1 of the South Lake Tahoe Recreation Facilities Joint Powers Authority Including to Extend the Term of the Special Tax for Thirty Years Commencing with Fiscal Year 2030-31, to Provide for Annual Increases in the Amount of the Special Tax, Commencing with Fiscal Year 2031-32, to Revise the List of Facilities, Services, and Incidental Expenses to be Financed by Community Facilities District No. 2000-1 on and after July 1, 2030, and to Make Certain Other Changes to the Administration of the District" (the "Resolution of Consideration"); and,

WHEREAS, said Resolution of Consideration set the time and place of a public hearing to consider the matters set forth in the Resolution of Consideration (the "Changes") for Thursday, January 22, 2026, at 9:00 a.m., in the South Lake Tahoe City Council Chambers, 1901 Lisa Maloff Way, South Lake Tahoe, California; and,

WHEREAS, notice of said public hearing was published as prescribed by law; and,

WHEREAS, said notice specifically referenced the right to submit written protests to the Changes; and,

WHEREAS, on January 22, 2026, the Governing Board held a noticed public hearing as required by law relative to the proposed Changes; and,

WHEREAS, at the public hearing all persons desiring to be heard on all matters pertaining to the proposed Changes were heard and a full and fair hearing was held; and,

WHEREAS, at the public hearing evidence was presented to the Board on the matters before it, and adoption of the Changes was not precluded by a majority protest of the type described in California Government Code Section 53337, and the Board at the conclusion of the hearing was fully advised as to all matters relating to the Changes; and,

WHEREAS, the Board has determined that there are more than twelve registered voters residing in the District and that the qualified electors in the District are the registered voters within the District; and,

WHEREAS, on the basis of all of the foregoing, the Board has determined at this time to submit the question of adopting the Changes to the qualified electors of the District;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED as follows:

Section 1. Findings. Each of the above recitals is true and correct. The Governing Board hereby finds that a public hearing to consider the proposed Changes was properly noticed and held on January 22, 2026, at 9:00 a.m. at the South Lake Tahoe City Council Chambers. The Board further finds that protests by 50 percent or more of the registered voters residing within the District, or the owners of one-half or more of the area of the land in the territory

included in the District and not exempt from the Special Tax, have not been filed. The Board finds that adoption of the Changes has not been precluded by a majority protest pursuant to California Government Code Section 53337.

Section 2. Call of Election. The Governing Board of the South Lake Tahoe Recreation Facilities Joint Powers Authority hereby calls a special election to be held on June 2, 2026, within the boundaries of the District for the purpose of allowing the registered voters within the District to vote on the question of whether to enact the Changes described in the Resolution of Consideration. The wording of the question to be placed on the ballot is as follows:

“Shall Community Facilities District No. 2000-1 of the South Lake Tahoe Recreation Facilities Joint Powers Authority be authorized to continue financing maintenance, improvements, and services to bicycle trails, community athletic fields, and Tahoe Paradise Park, with the Bicycle Advisory Committee guiding bicycle trail spending, by continuing to levy special taxes for 30 additional years, beginning July 1, 2030, such special tax rate calculated by property use, generating approximately \$645,000 per year, increased by 2% annually, all as provided in South Lake Tahoe Recreation Facilities Joint Powers Authority Resolution No. 2025-01?”

Section 3. Full Text of Measure. The full text of the Measure, which shall be printed in the ballot pamphlet, shall be:

“Shall the Special Tax within Community Facilities District No. 2000-1 of the South Lake Tahoe Recreation Facilities Joint Powers Authority (the “District”) be levied for an additional 30 years (commencing in fiscal year 2030-31) subject to annual increases of 2% of the maximum amount of the Special Tax for the prior fiscal year, pursuant to an Amended and Restated Rate and Method of Apportionment of Special Tax (the “Amended Rate and Method of Apportionment”) as provided in Resolution No. 2025-01 adopted by the Governing Board (the “Board”) of the South Lake Tahoe Recreation Facilities Joint Powers Authority (the “Authority”) on December 18, 2025, to pay for the Facilities, Services and Incidental Expenses (as defined in Resolution No. 2025-01 and described below), the amount of such Special Tax to be determined based on the Use Code assigned to each parcel of taxable property in the District by the Assessor of the County of El Dorado, California, pursuant to the Amended Rate and Method of Apportionment?”

And

Shall the Facilities, Services and Incidental Expenses to be Financed by Community Facilities District No. 2000-1 of the South Lake Tahoe Recreation Facilities Joint Powers Authority be amended, Commencing on and Effective as of July 1, 2030, to include the following Facilities, Services and Incidental Expenses?

Description of Facilities

The Facilities to be funded by the District include construction, renovation, and improvement of the following, whether existing or new, located in or near or otherwise benefiting the District:

1. Bicycle trails, bicycle lanes, and other facilities that support, promote, and/or enhance bicycling and/or the use of bicycle transportation improvements and amenities within the District;
2. Tahoe Paradise Park improvements, including play equipment and athletic fields, and related facilities, including but not limited to parking, restrooms, spectator seating, concession stands, storage, and other park, sporting, and recreational amenities;
3. Other public athletic fields and related improvements and amenities located

in or benefiting the District;

Description of Services

The services to be funded by the District include:

1. Maintenance and operation of existing or new public athletic fields and support facilities located on or adjacent to Lake Tahoe Community College;
2. Maintenance and operation of public recreation and support facilities located on property currently owned by the Tahoe Paradise Recreation and Park District;
3. Maintenance and operation of existing or new public athletic fields and support facilities located on Lake Tahoe Unified School District property;
4. Maintenance and operation of existing or new shared-use or Class 1 bicycle trails as defined in California Streets and Highways Code Section 890.4(a) located in the District and owned or operated by the City of South Lake Tahoe or the County of El Dorado;
5. Bicycle-related maintenance, services and/or programs within the District that promote and/or enhance bicycling within the District; and
6. Maintenance and operation of any other Facilities permitted to be funded by the District.

Description of Incidental Expenses

The incidental expenses to be funded by the District include:

1. The cost of engineering, planning, and designing of any Facilities permitted to be funded by the District;
2. All costs associated with the creation of the District and the Authority, amendments to and administration of the Joint Exercise of Powers Agreement Creating the Authority and the Joint Community Facilities Agreement among the Authority, the City of South Lake Tahoe, the County of El Dorado, and the Tahoe Paradise Recreation and Park District, and the determination, levy, and collection of the special tax; and
3. Any other costs incurred to carry out the authorized purposes of the District and to administer the District and the Authority.

And

Shall the Administrative Provisions of Community Facilities District No 2000-1 of the South Lake Tahoe Recreation Facilities Joint Powers Authority be amended, Commencing on and Effective as of July 1, 2030, to include the following Administrative Provisions?

Description of Administrative Provisions (Section 2, Resolution 2011-01)

To advise and assist the Board in the administration of funds for bicycle-related projects, the Board shall appoint, from time to time, and facilitate the activities of a "Bicycle Advisory Committee" that shall consist of no fewer than 3, and no more than 7, residents of the District (such members will not be members of the Board or employees of the District or any of the Authority's member entities and that are representative of the users of the bicycle facilities and services that are authorized to receive District funds). The Board shall consult with the Bicycle Advisory Committee and shall give due consideration to the recommendations of the Bicycle Advisory Committee on all bicycle related funding decisions.

The Fields Advisory Committee previously provided for under Resolution 2011-01 shall be terminated.

Section 4. Conduct of Election; Consolidation; Required Vote. Request is hereby made to the Registrar of Voters of the County of El Dorado to conduct said election on behalf of the Authority, acting as the legislative body of the District, and to consolidate the election with the elections of such other districts and agencies as may be holding elections on the same date. The Registrar of Voters is requested to provide all services and materials necessary to conduct the election including, but not limited to, giving notice of said election as required by law, designating precincts and polling places, preparing all elections materials, and canvassing and certifying the results of said special election. The measure shall be deemed approved if two-thirds of the votes cast on the measure are in favor of the proposed changes. Except as otherwise provided by the Mello-Roos Community Facilities Act of 1982, as amended, the election shall be conducted in accordance with the provisions of law regulating elections of the South Lake Tahoe Recreation Facilities Joint Powers Authority insofar as such provisions are determined by the County Registrar of Voters to be applicable.

Section 5. Transmittal to Registrar of Voters. The Secretary of the Governing Board of the South Lake Tahoe Recreational Facilities Joint Powers Authority is authorized and directed to transmit certified copies of this resolution and any necessary documents to the El Dorado County Registrar of Voters.

Section 6. California Environmental Quality Act Findings. The Governing Board finds that calling the special election and placing the proposal on the ballot is not a project under CEQA, pursuant to the CEQA Guidelines, California Code of Regulations, Title 14, Chapter 3, Section 15378(b)(4).

Section 7. This resolution shall be effective upon its adoption.

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE G

Measure G (the "Measure"), if approved by two-thirds of the voters voting thereon, would authorize within the boundaries of Community Facilities District No. 2000-1 (the "District") the continued levy of a special tax for an additional thirty years (beginning in Fiscal Year 2030-2031) and make changes to the authorized facilities, services, and incidental expenses that may be funded with that special tax. This Measure was placed on the ballot by the Board of Directors of the South Lake Tahoe Recreation Facilities Joint Powers Authority (the "Authority") pursuant to Resolution No. 2026-01, adopted on January 22, 2026.

In 2000, the County of El Dorado, the City of South Lake Tahoe, and the Tahoe Paradise Resort Improvement District entered into a Joint Exercise of Powers Agreement creating the Authority, which in turn formed the District. Voters within the District approved Measure S authorizing the issuance of bonds and the associated levy of a special tax to finance certain recreational facilities and services. In 2011, voters in the District approved an additional measure ("Measure R") that broadened the range of facilities that could be funded by Measure S funds. The special tax authorized by Measure S is scheduled to end in Fiscal Year 2029-2030.

If this Measure is approved, it would authorize the continued levy of the special tax first authorized by Measure S for an additional thirty years, commencing in Fiscal Year 2030-2031. The applicable special tax rates will vary by land use classification. For example, the proposed initial special tax rate for a typical single family dwelling is \$18 per parcel per year. Starting in Fiscal Year 2031-2032 and annually thereafter, the rate of the special tax will increase by 2% of the maximum rate for the prior fiscal year. The special tax authorized by this Measure is expected to generate total revenue of approximately \$645,000 per year.

This Measure would also revise the list of facilities, services, and incidental expenses that could be funded with the special tax. Eligible facilities would include, among other things, bicycle trails, Tahoe Paradise Park improvements, and other athletic fields and related improvements located in or benefiting the District. Eligible services would include maintenance and operation of, among other things, athletic fields at or adjacent to Lake Tahoe Community College, public recreation on property owned by the Tahoe Paradise Recreation and Park District, athletic fields on Lake Tahoe Unified School District property, and shared-use or Class 1 bicycle trails in the District and owned or operated by the City of South Lake Tahoe or the County of El Dorado. To assist the Board in the administration of funds for bicycle related projects, the Measure requires the Board to appoint a "Bicycle Advisory Committee" comprised of residents of the District.

A "YES" vote is a vote to extend the levy of the annual special tax for an additional thirty years and to amend the authorized uses, as provided in the Measure.

A "NO" vote is a vote against the extension of the special tax.

Facts about voting by mail in El Dorado County

After a ballot is received by the elections department, it is checked in for tracking purposes. Every signature is compared to the signature on the voter's registration card. If something doesn't match, the elections department will contact the voter to let them know. After a ballot is accepted for counting, it is carefully removed from its envelope, ensuring that the voters' privacy is protected. Once the ballot is removed from the envelope, it is counted by the central scanning equipment and then sealed in containers that are only opened for the post-election audit. Voter's privacy and their vote are always protected throughout the process. This entire process is available for the public to view.

- Postage is pre-paid on all return ballots.
- All signatures are compared to the signature on your voter registration card.
- If the signature doesn't match, you will be contacted and given an opportunity to correct the issue.
- You do not have to vote on all contests. Those you do vote on will still count.
- If you make a mistake, you can make the correction on your ballot by putting an "X" through the incorrect choice bubble, then filling in the correct choice bubble, or you can ask for a replacement ballot.
