The Statewide General Election will be held on Tuesday, November 3, 2026. Polls will be open 7:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. on Election Day.

Vote by Mail

All registered voters will receive a ballot by mail. Every Vote by Mail ballot is verified to ensure “One Person – One Vote” before it is counted. Ballots returned before Election Day will be included in the first results posted after the polls close.

You may return your ballot to any Vote Center, Drop Box, or by mail. If returning by mail, please make sure your envelope is postmarked on or before Election Day. To ensure a postmark, we recommend taking your ballot to the post office and requesting a postmark from a clerk.

We look forward to your participation and to counting your ballot on Election Day.

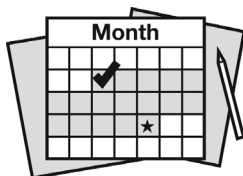
Vote by Mail

All registered voters will receive a ballot in the mail. Ballots will be mailed on **October 5, 2026**.

If you do not receive a ballot in the mail by **October 19, 2026** or need a replacement ballot, call us at **530-621-7480** or **800-730-4322** or come into our office at 3883 Ponderosa Rd., Shingle Springs, CA 95682.

You can return your ballot at an official county election drop box, at any Vote Center in El Dorado County or in the mail.

- * Be sure to use only black or blue ink to mark your ballot.
- * Be sure to **SIGN** the return envelope.

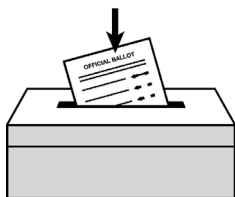

Accessible Voting

At the Vote Center:

All Vote Centers are ADA accessible with temporary thresholds or ramps, if needed.

Accessible Voting System:

Each Vote Center has at least three accessible ballot marking devices that offer:



- An audio option that reads the ballot to you
- A handheld tactile device with a universal plug for a personal assistive device
- Large text size with three viewing versions
- Spanish language ballot if you choose

Curbside Voting:

Voters may also visit any Vote Center and ask for curbside voting assistance.

Remote Accessible Vote by Mail Ballot (RAVBM) Assistance:

RAVBM allows voters to mark their selections using their own compatible technology to vote independently and privately in the comfort of their own home. You must have a printer to complete an RAVBM ballot.

How to request an RAVBM ballot:

- ✓ The voter must be registered in El Dorado County - you can check your voter status at: **voterstatus.sos.ca.gov**.
You can select to receive an RAVBM ballot on your voter status page from 29 days before the election through 4 p.m. on election day, or
- ✓ Go to our website: **www.eldoradocounty.ca.gov/County-Government/Elections/Accessible-Voting**
Complete the online form and submit it according to the directions on the form and mail the wet signature back to us at the address provided on the form.
 1. You will receive an email with a link to your ballot.
 2. Mark your selections.
 3. Download the balloting materials.
 4. Print your ballot.
 5. Sign the Declaration & Oath of Voter (this is the bottom section on the instructions to voter page).
 6. Return the printed and signed Declaration & Oath of Voter, along with the marked ballot, either by mail or by dropping it off at a vote center location or ballot drop box.

Note: The ballot cannot be returned electronically.



Language Needs Information

NOTICE TO VOTERS WITH LIMITED ENGLISH PROFICIENCY:

LanguageLine Solutions is our partner to eliminate any language barrier, including American Sign Language. Through them we have nearly instant access to trained video interpreters through a high-quality video application. This will help to reduce your frustration, make the interaction more efficient so you can get through your voting experience easier, and provide outstanding service to our limited English proficient, (LEP) and deaf and hard-of-hearing customers.

NOTE: The electronic Ballot Marking devices at each Vote Center will also have Spanish as an available option or you may request a Spanish paper ballot.

All Vote Centers will offer a Spanish ballot. To request to have one sent to you before Election Day, please call our office at (530) 621-7480. Requests must be received no later than 7 days before Election Day.

If you need assistance when voting, you may bring up to two people with you to your polling location, as long as they are not representatives of your employer or your union. Bring a family member or friend!

Who is on the ballot in the General Election?

In the General Election, all voters receive the same ballot, no matter what political party you are registered with (or if you have no party preference). Your physical address where you are registered to vote determines which contests are on your ballot. In the Primary Election, the top two candidates with the most votes in each voter-nominated office advance to the General Election ballot regardless of their party preference.

Prop. 34 – Expenditure Limitations: State Legislative Candidates

Proposition 34 was passed by voters in November 2000. The law requires county election officials to provide the names of those State Legislative candidates who have voluntarily agreed to expenditure limits. Candidates who agree to the expenditure limits may submit and pay for a Candidate's Statement of Qualification to be printed in this pamphlet. The following State Legislative candidates appearing on ballots in El Dorado County have accepted the voluntary expenditure limitations pursuant to Proposition 34.

In the Primary election, if a candidate for a non-partisan office received majority vote, they were elected and are not on the General Election ballot. However, if no candidate won, the two candidates with the most votes advance to the General Election.

Do I need to register again for each election?

No. Fill out a new Voter Registration card only if you have moved, changed your name, or want to change your party affiliation. You may register to vote online at registertovote.ca.gov. Party Endorsement

ELECTION CODE 13302. (b) In connection with an election at which a candidate for a voter-nominated office will appear on the ballot, a qualified political party may submit to the county elections official a list of all candidates for voter-nominated office who will appear on a ballot in the county in question, and who have been endorsed by the party by whatever lawful mechanism the party adopts for endorsing candidates for voter-nominated office. If a political party timely submits a list to the county elections official pursuant to this subdivision, the county elections official shall print the names of the candidates for voter-nominated office who were endorsed by that political party in the voter information portion of the county voter information guide. The party chairperson shall provide a written copy of the list of candidates endorsed by the party not later than 83 days before the election at which the candidate for a voter-nominated office will appear on the ballot. *(Amended by Stats. 2016, Ch. 3, Sec. 43. Effective January 1, 2017.)*

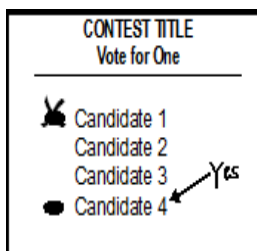

These increases (42-57%) stem from the no-bid contract with Granite, and paying the proposed debt. With costs already \$48M above the 2024 Rate Study, additional increases may follow. Residents also face five-figure bills to move water lines.

Cost of living is a challenge here. Competitive bidding and drawing on some of TCPUD's \$56M cash would allow more moderate rate increases while still improving reliability and wildfire safety.

The special tax may not be reduced or adjusted at the beginning of each fiscal year, commencing (July 1, 2027), following a public hearing, by an amount not to exceed the cost of living as determined by the Consumer Price Index (CPI) prepared by the United States Bureau of Labor Statistics or similar indicator of inflation not to exceed 4%.

3. **Election Date**

The measure shall be submitted to the voters at the **November 3, 2026 General Election**.

4. **Use of Funds**

Revenue generated by the increased parcel tax shall be used exclusively for District purposes, including:

- Road maintenance
- Upgrading district roads
- Improving district roads

5. **Accountability Measures**

To ensure transparency and accountability:

- Funds shall be deposited into a separate account: Garden Valley Ranch Estates General Fund.
- An annual report shall be made available to the public.
- Funds shall not be used for administrative salaries unrelated to service delivery.

6. **Levy and Collection**

The current assessment has not been updated since 1997. Over nearly three decades, inflation has significantly increased the cost of materials, labor, and equipment. As a result, the same revenue now accomplishes only a fraction of the work it once did, making it increasingly difficult to keep up with essential road maintenance.

The numbers make this clear. A recent estimate to pave just two miles of road was approximately **\$400,000**. Our most recent chip seal project, completed in July 2025, cost **\$48,000** to treat just **2,400** feet (less than one-half mile), or about **\$1 per square foot**. With approximately **seven miles** of roads still needing maintenance, the current funding simply cannot meet the community's long-term needs.

Today, the district receives approximately **\$55,000 annually**, including **\$26,400 contributed directly by residents**, with the remainder coming from county funding. While these funds have been carefully managed, they are no longer sufficient to address rising costs or preserve our roads at the level our community deserves.

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE K

Measure K (the "Measure"), if approved by two-thirds of the voters voting thereon, would authorize the levy of a special tax at the rate of \$520 per parcel (whether improved or unimproved) per year within the Tegra Road Zone of Benefit #98123 of County Service Area 9 (the "Zone"). This Measure was placed on the ballot by the Board of Supervisors of the County of El Dorado at the request of the advisory committee for the Zone pursuant to Resolution No. 099-2026, which was passed at an official meeting of the Board of Supervisors on June 16, 2026.

If approved, the special tax authorized by this Measure will be used solely for the purpose of road improvements and maintenance services within the Zone. The amount of the special tax may be adjusted annually in accordance with the Engineering News Record Construction Cost Index, not to exceed 3% annually. The special tax authorized by this Measure would become effective in Fiscal Year 2027/2028 and remain in effect until modified or repealed by the voters. The special tax authorized by this Measure is expected to generate revenue of approximately \$11,960 per year. If the Measure is approved, the special tax would replace an existing assessment of \$260 per parcel. If the Measure is not approved, the existing assessment of \$260 per parcel will remain in effect.

State law requires the proceeds from the special tax be applied only to the identified purposes and that an annual report be made indicating the amount of funds collected and expended and the status of any project required or authorized to be funded by the proceeds.

The special tax authorized by this Measure will be listed as a separate item on the county property tax bill for each affected parcel of land and will be collected in the same manner as the general property tax. All laws applicable to the levy, collection, and enforcement of county property taxes, including the provisions for penalties and the procedures for sale of the property in case of delinquency, shall also apply to the special tax.

A "YES" vote is a vote to authorize the levy of the annual special tax in an amount of \$520 per parcel, as provided in the Measure.

A "NO" vote is a vote against the levy of the annual special tax.

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors of the County of El Dorado formed County Service Area (CSA) No. 9 pursuant to Title 3, Division 2, Part 2, Chapter 2.2 of the California Government Code and established zones of benefit within CSA No. 9; and

WHEREAS, this Board formed the Rancho Ponderosa Estates Road Zone of Benefit No. 98154 on August 8, 1989 by Resolution 257-89 for the purposes of providing road improvements and maintenance services; and

WHEREAS, the extended services provided within CSA No. 9 zones are authorized services pursuant to Government Code section 25213; and

WHEREAS, California Government Code section 25215.2, together with section 25217.4, expressly authorizes a zone within a county service area to levy a special tax for road improvement and maintenance services subject to voter approval; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to California State Law, the Board of Supervisors is required to place before the electorate the approval of the measure as shown on Exhibit A before the special tax can be levied, or increased over the amount previously approved by the electorate; and

WHEREAS, the County Registrar of Voters has determined that fifty-seven (57) registered voters reside within the zone of benefit boundaries; and

WHEREAS, such special tax amount increase shall take effect only if approved by a two-thirds majority of the voters casting a ballot in the special tax ballot proceeding; and

WHEREAS, the zone advisory committee has determined an annual special tax amount of \$500.00 for each parcel of land, whether it is improved or unimproved regardless of use, is reasonable and sufficient to provide road improvement and maintenance services within the zone of benefit for the fiscal year 2027/2028, and thereafter; and

WHEREAS, if the measure as shown on Exhibit A does not pass, the existing service charge of \$225.00 shall remain in effect.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Supervisors that:

1. The measure shown on Exhibit A shall be submitted to the voters of the Rancho Ponderosa Estates Road Zone of Benefit 98154 within County Service Area 9.
2. The El Dorado County Registrar of Voters shall submit the measure as shown on Exhibit A to the electorate in a mailed ballot election to be held on November 3, 2026.

3. The tax as shown on Exhibit A, if approved, shall appear as a separate item on the tax bill of each affected parcel and shall be collected at the same time and in the same manner as county ad valorem property taxes are collected as set forth in the applicable provisions of the Revenue and Taxation Code, and shall be subject to the same penalties and the same procedure and sale in case of delinquency as provided for such taxes. All laws applicable to the levy, collection, and enforcement of county property taxes shall be applicable to the tax.
4. The special tax is subject to the accountability measures required by State Law, including Government Code sections 50075.1.
5. Notification shall be provided of the special tax increase, if approved, to each non-resident property owner within the zone boundaries, in accordance with the requirements of Government Code section 54930.
6. The special tax amount shown on Exhibit A shall take effect and be imposed only if it is approved by a two-thirds majority of the votes cast on the measure in the election to be conducted on November 3, 2026.

“Shall the measure to levy an annual special tax in an amount of \$500.00 on each parcel of land within the Rancho Ponderosa Estates Zone of Benefit commencing fiscal year 2027/2028 and continuing for an unlimited duration, to be used only for road improvements and maintenance and generating an annual revenue of approximately \$14,500, to replace the current benefit assessment of \$225, be adopted?”

WHEREAS, this Board formed the Fernwood-Cothrin Ranch Road Zone of Benefit No. 98114 on April 30, 1985 by Resolution 91-85 for the purposes of providing road improvements and maintenance services; and

WHEREAS, the extended services provided within CSA No. 9 zones are authorized services pursuant to Government Code section 25213; and

WHEREAS, California Government Code section 25215.2, together with section 25217.4, expressly authorizes a zone within a county service area to levy a special tax for road improvement and maintenance services subject to voter approval; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to California State Law, the Board of Supervisors is required to place before the electorate the approval of the measure as shown on Exhibit A before the special tax can be levied, or increased over the amount previously approved by the electorate; and

WHEREAS, the County Registrar of Voters has determined that four hundred ninety (490) registered voters reside within the zone of benefit boundaries; and

WHEREAS, such special tax amount increase shall take effect only if approved by a two-thirds majority of the voters casting a ballot in the special tax ballot proceeding; and

WHEREAS, the zone advisory committee has determined an annual special tax amount of \$375.00 annually adjusted for cost of living using the Engineering News Record Construction Cost Index for each parcel of land, whether it is improved or unimproved regardless of use, is reasonable and sufficient to provide road improvement and maintenance services within the zone of benefit for the fiscal year 2027/2028, and thereafter; and

WHEREAS, if the measure as shown on Exhibit A does not pass, the existing special tax of \$150.00 shall remain in effect.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Supervisors that:

1. The measure shown on Exhibit A shall be submitted to the voters of the Fernwood-Cothrin Ranch Road Zone of Benefit 98114 within County Service Area 9.
2. The El Dorado County Registrar of Voters shall submit the measure as shown on Exhibit A to the electorate in a mailed ballot election to be held on November 3, 2026.

3. The tax as shown on Exhibit A, if approved, shall appear as a separate item on the tax bill of each affected parcel and shall be collected at the same time and in the same manner as county ad valorem property taxes are collected as set forth in the applicable provisions of the Revenue and Taxation Code, and shall be subject to the same penalties and the same procedure and sale in case of delinquency as provided for such taxes. All laws applicable to the levy, collection, and enforcement of county property taxes shall be applicable to the tax.
4. The Director of Transportation, or designee, is delegated the authority to annually adjust the rate of the tax for cost of living using the Engineering News Record Construction Cost Index.
5. The special tax is subject to the accountability measures required by State Law, including Government Code sections 50075.1.
6. Notification shall be provided of the special tax increase, if approved, to each non-resident property owner within the zone boundaries, in accordance with the requirements of Government Code section 54930.
7. The special tax amount shown on Exhibit A shall take effect and be imposed only if it is approved by a two-thirds majority of the votes cast on the measure in the election to be conducted on November 3, 2026.

“Shall the measure to levy an annual special tax in an amount of \$375.00 with annual adjustments tied to the Engineering News Record Construction Cost Index on each parcel of land within the Fernwood-Cothrin Ranch Zone of Benefit commencing fiscal year 2027/2028 and continuing for an unlimited duration, to be used only for road improvements and maintenance and generating an annual revenue of approximately \$99,000.00, to replace the current special tax of \$150.00, be adopted?”

ARGUMENT IN FAVOR OF MEASURE M

No one wants to pay more property taxes. BUT - we all know that the roads in our Zone of Benefit need work and that repairs aren't keeping up. Outside of the Zone of Benefit Special Tax, there are no other public funds that can be used for our roads. This measure will increase the per-parcel road tax to \$375.00 a year from \$150.00 a year – the equivalent of raising our daily “road cost” to \$1.03 per day from 41 cents. If passed, this will be the first time in 28 years – since 1998 – that the road tax will increase. *The California Constitution stipulates that a 2/3 majority vote is needed to pass any Special Tax.*

Currently, the special tax collects \$39,600 per year from the 264 parcels within the Zone. For FY 26-27, the county fixed administrative fees (\$8,490.92) and insurance (\$10,846.00) total \$19,336.92, leaving approximately \$20,263 for road work.

These administrative costs are assessed on each County Zone of Benefit and are based on zone miles, not as a proportion of special tax revenue.

\$375.00 per parcel would generate \$99,000, leaving almost \$80,000 available for road work and savings for contingencies.

Over the last five years, the volunteer Zone of Benefit Advisory Committee has spearheaded four \$20k chipseal projects on Ranch Gate and Cothrin Ranch Roads between Sun Ridge Ranch and Heather Lane, and has purchased multiple pallets of patch material for volunteer use. There is no reserve for emergency repairs, like a \$100,000.00 culvert failure. There are many segments of our through-routes – Cothrin, Fernwood, Bullard – to fix, and there are culverts and ditches to repair.

ORDINANCE NO. 2026-01

Rolling Hills Community Services District

An Ordinance of the Rolling Hills Community Services District
Enacting A Special Parcel Tax to Fund District Services in Rolling
Hills Community Services District Zone No. 1 Subject To The
Approval Of The Voters

WHEREAS, the Rolling Hills Community Services District ("District") is authorized pursuant to Article XIII C of the California Constitution and California Government Code sections 61121, 61141, and 50077 to levy a special tax, subject to approval by two-thirds (2/3) of the qualified electors voting on the measure; and

WHEREAS, the District is authorized by Government Code sections 61140 through 61144 to levy a special tax within specified areas of the District by forming a new zone to fund any service, any level of service, or any facility that the District may exercise in the District as a whole; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors ("Board") finds that additional, stable funding is necessary to maintain and improve District infrastructure and services, including but not limited to fire mitigation, roads, drainage, lighting, landscaping, parks, and related facilities and safety improvements; and

WHEREAS, the District currently levies a District Improvement Assessment of \$200 annually on all property within the District, and the Board intends that such assessment shall remain in full force and effect and unchanged, and that no action is being taken by this Ordinance to modify, increase, replace, or repeal such assessment; and

WHEREAS, the current level of District Improvement Assessment has not changed since 1987, and the Board has determined that the amount is not sufficient to provide the stable funding necessary to maintain and provide District infrastructure and services, and that an additional funding source is needed; and

WHEREAS, the Sierramonte subdivision is a gated community that maintains its own internal infrastructure through a homeowners' association and funds the maintenance and improvement of private infrastructure within the neighborhood through dues paid to the homeowners' association, reducing the District's need for additional funding. The District's funding needs are therefore limited to the portions of the District that exclude the Sierramonte subdivision; and

WHEREAS, the Board adopted Resolution No. 26-04 forming Rolling Hills Community Services District Zone No. 1, which includes all territory within the jurisdictional boundaries of the District, excluding the Sierramonte subdivision, as described in Resolution No. 26-01; and

WHEREAS, the Board has submitted to the voters of the District, at the November 3, 2026, election, a measure to authorize a special tax to fund District services in Zone 1 and to increase the District's appropriations limit by the amount of anticipated revenue from the proposed special tax. The formation of Zone 1 and the special tax will be approved if two-thirds of voters voting on the measure vote in favor of it.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Directors of the Rolling Hills Community Services District as follows:

SECTION 1. AUTHORITY

The District enacts this ordinance in accordance with the authority granted to Community Services Districts pursuant to California Government Code sections 61121, 61141, and 50077.

SECTION 2. RECITALS

All Recitals contained in this Ordinance are true and correct and are incorporated herein by reference.

SECTION 3. DEFINITIONS

For the purposes of this Ordinance, the following terms shall have the meanings provided below:

- A. "Administrator" means an official of the District, or designee thereof, responsible for carrying out the provisions of this Ordinance.
- B. "Assessor's Parcel Number" means the Parcel and Parcel Number as assigned by the Rolling Hills Community Service District Assessor on the equalized tax roll.
- C. "Board" means the Board of Directors of the District.
- D. "Consumer Price Index" or "CPI" means the Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U) for Sacramento-Roseville-Folsom as published by the U.S. Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics. If the Consumer Price Index is discontinued or revised, such other government index or computation with which it is replaced shall be used to obtain substantially the same result as would be obtained if the Consumer Price Index had not been discontinued or revised.
- E. "County" means the County of El Dorado.
- F. "County Assessor" or "Assessor" means the County Assessor of County of El Dorado.
- G. "County Assessor's parcel" means a lot or Parcel with an assigned Assessor's Parcel Number used by the County Assessor in preparing the tax roll.
- H. "District" means the Rolling Hills Community Service District.
- I. "Fiscal Year" means the period starting July 1 and ending the following June 30.
- J. "Parcel" means any County Assessor's parcel in Zone 1 based on the equalized tax roll of the County as of January 1 of each Fiscal Year.
- K. "Rolling Hills Community Services District Zone 1" or "Zone 1" means the zone of the District formed by Board Resolution No. 26-04.
- L. "Special tax" means the special parcel tax authorized and imposed by this Ordinance.
- M. "Taxable parcel" means any Parcel that is not a Tax-Exempt Parcel.
- N. "Tax exempt parcel" means any parcel that is exempt from the special tax, as provided for in this Ordinance.

SECTION 4. TAX IMPOSED

- A. An annual special tax at the rates set forth in Section 5 is hereby imposed on every taxable parcel within the District.
- B. The special tax constitutes a debt owed by the owner of each parcel to the District.
- C. The special tax shall be levied and collected on each parcel within the District for which the owner receives a separate ad valorem property tax bill.
- D. Tax exempt parcels are exempt from any liability for the special tax.

SECTION 5.**TAX RATES**

- A. The rate of the special tax for each type of taxable parcel shall be Two Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$250.00) annually.
- B. After the first year that the special tax is levied, to keep the tax on each taxable parcel in constant first year dollars for each year, the special tax rate may be adjusted annually by the change in the Consumer Price Index from the preceding year, using the most recent month when the calculation is performed, not to exceed three percent (3%).
- C. The assessment roll data of the El Dorado County Tax Assessor as of January 1 of each year and District records shall be used to identify taxable parcels.

SECTION 6.**EXEMPTIONS**

A parcel shall be exempt from the special tax if it is exempt from the special tax under other applicable law.

SECTION 7.**COLLECTION OF TAX**

The special tax may be collected in the same manner as ordinary ad valorem taxes are collected and, if collected in that manner, shall have the same lien priority and be subject to the same penalties and the same procedure and sale in cases of delinquency as provided for ad valorem taxes collected by the County of El Dorado. The District Board of Directors may provide for other alternative methods of collection of the special tax by resolution.

SECTION 8.**COLLECTION OF UNPAID TAX**

The amount of the special tax, any penalty, and any interest imposed under the provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed a debt owed to the District. Any person owing money to the District under the provisions of this Ordinance shall be personally liable to an action brought in the name of the District, at its option, for the recovery for such amount.

SECTION 9.**USE OF TAX REVENUE**

- A. Revenue from the special tax, including penalties and interest thereon, shall be used to maintain and improve existing District facilities and services provided within Zone 1, including but not limited to fire mitigation, roads, drainage, lighting, landscaping, and parks.
- B. At the District Board of Directors' discretion, revenue from the special tax, including penalties and interest thereon, may also be used to pay for the costs of holding an election to seek voter approval of this Ordinance, for the costs of administering the special tax, and for the costs of defending the special tax and this Ordinance, including attorneys' fees and related costs.

SECTION 10.**ACCOUNTABILITY**

In accordance with the requirements of California Government Code Sections 50075.1 and 50075.3, the following accountability measures, among others, shall apply to the special tax:

- A. A separate, special account, referred to as the Zone 1 Special Tax Fund, shall be created, into which the proceeds of the special tax, including penalties and interest earned on such proceeds, must be deposited.

- B. The specific purposes of the special tax are for the District facilities and services in Zone 1 and for related election, administration, and legal fees as set forth in Section 7. The proceeds of the special tax shall be applied only to those specific purposes.
- C. The Administrator shall annually prepare and submit to the District Board of Directors a report regarding the special tax funds collected and expended, as well as any other information required by Government Code sections 50075.1 and 50075.3.

SECTION 11. INTERPRETATION, APPLICATION, AND APPEAL OF SPECIAL TAX FORMULA AND PROCEDURES

- A. Any taxpayer who feels the amount of the special tax assigned to a parcel is in error may file a notice with the Administrator appealing the levy of the special tax. The Administrator then will promptly review the appeal and, if necessary, meet with the applicant. If the Administrator verifies that the special tax levied on the applicant's parcel should be modified or changed, the special tax levy will be corrected and, if applicable in any case, a credit or refund will be granted. The appeal must be filed not later than one year after having paid the special tax that is disputed.
- B. Interpretations may be made by the District, by Resolution or Ordinance of the Board, for purposes of clarifying any vagueness or ambiguity as it relates to the special tax rate, the classification of properties, or any definition applicable to the special tax.
- C. Without Board approval, the Administrator may make minor, non-substantive administrative and technical interpretations of the provisions of this Ordinance for purposes of administrative efficiency or convenience or to comply with new applicable federal, state, or local law, so long as any interpretation does not materially affect the rate and manner of collection of the special tax.

SECTION 12. AMENDMENTS

This Ordinance may only be amended by a vote of the people if the amendment would result in the special tax being imposed, extended, or increased in a manner not authorized by this Ordinance as originally approved by the voters, or if the amendment would substantially alter the purpose of the special tax. The District Board of Directors may enact other amendments, including but not limited to amendments necessary to implement or administer the special tax.

SECTION 13. EXPIRATION OF TAX

The authority to levy the special tax shall remain in effect unless a later ordinance is adopted and approved by the voters that either repeals the special tax or establishes a date that the authority to levy the special tax shall terminate.

SECTION 14. ADJUSTMENT OF APPROPRIATIONS LIMIT

Pursuant to California Constitution Article XIII B, the appropriation limit for Rolling Hills Community Service District is hereby increased by the aggregate sum authorized to be levied by this special tax for fiscal year 2027-28 and each year thereafter.

SECTION 15.

ORDINANCE PUBLICATION

- A. A summary of this Ordinance shall be published and a certified copy of the full text of this Ordinance shall be posted in the office of the Rolling Hills Community Service District Clerk at least five (5) days prior to the Board of Directors meeting at which it is adopted.
- B. A summary of this Ordinance shall be published within fifteen (15) days after the adoption, together with the names of the Board of Directors voting for or against same, in the Mountain Democrat, a newspaper of general circulation in the County of El Dorado, State of California.

SECTION 16.

COMPLIANCE WITH THE CALIFORNIA ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY ACT

This Ordinance is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (Public Resources Code §§ 21000 et seq., "CEQA," and 14 Cal. Code Reg. §§ 15000 et seq., "CEQA Guidelines"). The special tax authorized by this Ordinance is a special tax that can only be used to fund the projects, facilities, and services described in the Ordinance but does not approve any of the described projects or services. As such, under CEQA Guidelines section 15378(b)(4), the special tax is not a project within the meaning of CEQA because it creates a government funding mechanism that does not involve any commitment to any specific project or service that may result in a potentially significant physical impact on the environment. If revenue from the tax were used for a purpose that would have such effect, the District would undertake the required CEQA review for that particular project or service at the earliest feasible time prior to approval consistent with CEQA Guidelines Sections 15004 and 15352. Therefore, pursuant to CEQA Guidelines Section 15060, review of the Ordinance under CEQA is not required. Prior to commencement of any project or service funded by the special tax, any necessary environmental review required by CEQA shall be completed.

SECTION 17.

SEVERABILITY

If any provision of this Ordinance is held by any court or by any Federal or State agency of competent jurisdiction, to be invalid as conflicting with any Federal or State law, rule or regulation now or hereafter in effect, or is held by such court or agency to be modified in any way in order to conform to the requirements of any such law, rule or regulation, such provision shall be considered a separate, distinct, and independent part of this ordinance, and such holding shall not affect the validity and enforceability of all other provisions hereof. In the event that such law, rule or regulation is subsequently repealed, rescinded, amended or otherwise changed, so that the provision thereof which had previously been held invalid or modified is no longer in conflict with such law, rule or regulation, said provision shall thereupon return to full force and effect and shall thereafter be binding. If any section, subsection, phrase, clause, sentence, or word in this Ordinance shall for any reason be held invalid or unconstitutional by a court of competent jurisdiction, it shall not nullify the remainder of this Ordinance but shall be confined to the article, section, subsection, subdivision, clause, sentence or word so held invalid or unconstitutional.

SECTION 18.**DATE OF ADOPTION AND EFFECTIVE DATE**

This Ordinance shall be considered adopted on the date of the declaration of the vote at the November 3, 2026 election and shall become effective 10 days thereafter.

"Shall the measure authorizing the Rolling Hills Community Services District to levy a special tax in the amount of \$250 per parcel annually, subject to an annual inflation adjustment not to exceed 3%, on all parcels within the District, except the Sierramonte subdivision, generating \$87,250 annually, until ended by voters, and increasing the District's appropriations limit, to maintain District infrastructure and services, including fire mitigation, roads, drainage, lighting, landscaping, and parks, be approved?"

ARGUMENT IN FAVOR OF MEASURE N

A "YES" vote on Measure N will protect the viability of the Rolling Hills Community Services District by providing additional necessary funding to help maintain and improve the community infrastructure.

The current assessment of \$200 per parcel, per year, goes to maintain the roads, culverts, street lighting, parks, and open spaces, and has not been increased since 1987. This amount is inadequate, and does not keep pace with the rising costs of repair and inflation.

In addition to funding routine maintenance and long-term road repair, this additional revenue will allow the District to address the aging infrastructure that has needed attention for many years. This also allows the District to be financially prepared for the irregular expenditures scattered through future years when additional items eventually require replacement.

Some examples of areas that will benefit from the additional revenue are; deferred District replacement of approximately 115 directional/street signs, Stonebriar and Berkshire Park furnishings replacement, Stonebriar Park play area replacement, District Open space maintenance, Irrigation systems repair/replacement, District-wide drainage inspection. By investing in ongoing preventative maintenance today, the District will reduce the likelihood of more costly repairs in the future.

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE N

Measure N (the "Measure"), if approved by two-thirds of the voters voting thereon, would authorize the levy of a special parcel tax at the rate of \$250 per parcel per year within Zone No. 1 of the Rolling Hills Community Services District (the "District"). This Measure was placed on the ballot by the Board of Directors of the District pursuant to Resolution No. 26-04, which was passed at an official meeting of the Board of Directors on June 23, 2026.

The proposed special parcel tax would be levied only within Zone No. 1, which includes all territory within the jurisdictional boundaries of the District except for the area commonly referred to as the Sierramonte subdivision. If approved, the special parcel tax authorized by this Measure will be used solely for the purpose of maintaining and improving existing District facilities and services provided within Zone No. 1, including but not limited to fire mitigation, roads, drainage, lighting, landscaping, and parks. The amount of the special parcel tax may be adjusted annually in accordance with the Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers, not to exceed 3% annually. The special parcel tax authorized by this Measure would remain in effect until modified or repealed by the voters. The special parcel tax authorized by this Measure is expected to generate revenue of approximately \$87,250 per year. This Measure will have no effect on the existing \$200 annual assessment within the District.

State law requires the proceeds from the special tax be applied only to the identified purposes and that an annual report be made indicating the amount of funds collected and expended and the status of any project required or authorized to be funded by the proceeds.

The special tax authorized by this Measure will be listed as a separate item on the county property tax bill for each affected parcel of land and will be collected in the same manner as the general property tax. All laws applicable to the levy, collection, and enforcement of county property taxes, including the provisions for penalties and the procedures for sale of the property in case of delinquency, shall also apply to the special tax.

A "YES" vote is a vote to authorize the levy of the annual special tax in an amount of \$250 per parcel within Zone No. 1, as provided in the Measure.

A "NO" vote is a vote against the levy of the annual special parcel tax.

TO PROVIDE EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMS AND SUPPORT SERVICES FOR STUDENTS WITHIN TAHOE TRUCKEE UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT

Findings

Tahoe Truckee Unified School District (the "District") provides a high-quality education at 12 schools serving approximately 4,000 local students residing in portions of Nevada County, Placer County, and El Dorado County in the Truckee, North Lake Tahoe and West Shore areas.

District schools have earned prestigious honors including California Distinguished School recognition, reflecting the District's strong academics, innovative programs, and success preparing students for college, careers, and beyond.

Studies show that good local schools increase demand for homes and help protect local quality of life and protect property values.

Since 1989, the District has benefited from local school parcel tax funding approved by voters that represents over 5% of the school district budget.

Parcel tax funding supplements unstable and inadequate funding from the State of California (the "State") that only supports a basic education.

Locally controlled parcel tax funding allows the District to attract and retain qualified and experienced teachers, maintain manageable class sizes, and support quality academic and job training programs that prepare students for success in college and the workforce.

Unless renewed by voters, local parcel tax funding will expire soon and over \$5 million will need to be cut from the budget, forcing teacher layoffs, cuts to academic programs, and increased class sizes.

To help prevent cuts to teaching and academic programs, the Board of Trustees (the "Board") believes that local parcel tax funding needs to be renewed at the current \$148 annual parcel tax rate and increased by \$40 to account for value lost to inflation since last renewed in 2018.

If approved, a local school funding renewal measure would continue this funding for 9 years and provide approximately \$7 million annually in locally controlled school funding.

Funds from a local school funding renewal measure would continue to support programs in science, technology, engineering, and math; attract and retain highly qualified teachers; maintain career technical education and job training programs for in-demand fields like health sciences and skilled trades; and maintain manageable class sizes.

All money raised from a local school funding renewal measure must stay local and could not be taken by the state or federal governments.

An independent oversight committee, annual audits, and public spending disclosure would continue to ensure funds are spent as promised.

No funds from a local school funding renewal measure can be used for administrator salaries.

Homeowners age 65 and older would continue to be eligible for an exemption from the cost and do not need to reapply.

Low-income people with disabilities are also eligible for an exemption from the cost.

INTRODUCTION AND PURPOSE

To protect quality education in local schools, continue supporting math, science, engineering, technology, arts, and skilled trades, job training programs preparing students for success in college and careers; attracting and retaining highly qualified teachers; and maintaining manageable class sizes, the District proposes a measure be adopted, renewing the expiring \$148 annual school parcel tax with a \$40 increase, for nine years, with senior exemptions, annual inflation adjustments, independent oversight and audits, and all funds (approximately \$7,000,000 annually) benefiting local students.

The proceeds of the parcel tax may be used for any of the following purposes:

Academic Programs

The continued enhancement of elementary, middle and high school academic programs, such as enrichment classes, college preparatory courses, science education, outdoor education, and academic electives, by providing qualified teachers and acquiring necessary instructional supplies and equipment.

Career Technical Education

The continued enhancement of high school career technical education curricula by updating equipment, developing new programs, and maintaining current programs and classes that address local vocational needs and prepare students for living wage careers.

Classroom Equipment and Supplies

The continued provision of instructional supplies, books, and equipment.

Technology Equipment and Curriculum

The continued support for computer and technology services, licenses, equipment purchases, staffing, maintenance, training, and curriculum development to enhance the capacity of students to fully utilize technology in their educational and professional pursuits.

Physical Education

The continued support of elementary school physical education programs and the acquisition of necessary physical education equipment and supplies at all school sites.

Visual and Performing Arts

Support for the elementary, middle and high school visual and performing arts programs including music, drama, and art, with teachers, equipment, and supplies.

Libraries

The continued staffing of all comprehensive high schools with certificated librarians, support for library services at elementary and middle schools, and the continued acquisition of library books and equipment for all school sites.

Social Emotional Support, Counseling and Nursing Services

Support for character education, counseling and nursing services and curriculum that encourage student wellbeing and social/emotional development.

RATE AND PROCEDURE

Subject to two thirds approval of the voters, this local funding measure and its parcel tax (a "Qualified Special Tax" under Government Code section 50079) will become effective as of July 1, 2027. The tax will be levied at the current rate of \$148 with an increase of \$40, for a total of \$188, per parcel of taxable real property per year for nine (9) years. The tax will be collected by the Nevada County Tax Collector, the Placer County Tax Collector, and the El Dorado County Tax Collector (the "Tax Collectors") at the same time as and along with, and will be subject to the same penalties as, general *ad valorem* taxes collected by said Tax Collectors. The tax and penalty will bear interest at the same rate as the rate for unpaid *ad valorem* property taxes until paid. Any tax levied will become a lien upon the properties against which taxes are assessed and collectible as herein provided.

To account for changes in the cost of delivering the classroom programs and student services supported by the qualified special tax, the tax rate shall be adjusted annually pursuant to this provision. Each year, beginning with the 2028-2029 tax year, the tax rate shall be adjusted to account for inflation by the average of the reported periodic annual percentage changes in the Consumer Price Index-All Urban Consumers, San Francisco-Oakland-Hayward area (Series CUURA422SA0) over the prior twelve months, as of April of each year, as published by the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics; provided, however that the annual adjustment in the tax shall not exceed 3% per year, but in no case be less than 0% per year. Any adjustment shall be rounded to the nearest dollar. In the event the Consumer Price Index-All Urban Consumers, San Francisco-Oakland-Hayward area (Series CUURA422SA0) is no longer published, the Board shall adopt a comparable index of general price levels as it shall determine.

With respect to all general property tax matters within its jurisdiction, the Nevada County Tax Assessor, Placer County Tax Assessor, and the El Dorado County Tax Assessor, or other appropriate County tax officials (the "Counties") will make all final determinations of tax exemption or relief for any reason, and that decision will be final and binding. With respect to matters specific to the levy of the Qualified Special Tax, including exemptions, the decisions of the District will be final and binding. The procedures described herein, and any additional procedures established by the Board of Trustees, will be the exclusive claims procedure for claimants seeking an exemption, refund, reduction, or re-computation of the special tax. Whether any particular claim is to be resolved by the District or by the Counties will be determined by the District, in coordination with the Counties as necessary.

The Board may adopt such additional or supplemental procedures as it deems necessary or convenient for the administration of the Qualified Special Tax.

A "Parcel of Taxable Real Property" is defined as any unit of real property within the District's boundaries that receives a separate tax bill for ad valorem property taxes from the County Tax Collector. All property that is otherwise exempt from or upon which no ad valorem property taxes are levied in any year will also be exempt from the special tax in such year.

This qualified special tax is estimated to raise \$7 million in annual local funding for District schools. The amount of annual local funding raised by this qualified special tax will vary from year-to-year due to changes in the number of parcels subject to the levy and the cost of living increase.

If this Measure is approved by voters, the levy of the qualified special tax authorized by voters at the November 2018 election known as "Measure AA" shall end on the first day that the Qualified Special Tax authorized by this Measure is levied. If this Measure is not approved by voters, Measure AA will continue to be collected pursuant to its terms.

EXEMPTIONS

Upon application and pursuant to any procedures adopted by the District, an exemption from payment of the qualified special tax may be granted to a parcel owned by:

- 1) Persons who are aged sixty-five (65) years or older ("Senior Exemption").
- 2) Persons receiving Supplemental Security Income for a disability, regardless of age, and occupying said parcel as his or her primary residence ("SSI Exemption").
- 3) Persons receiving Social Security Disability Insurance benefits, regardless of age, whose yearly income does not exceed 250 percent of the 2012 federal poverty guidelines issued by the United States Department of Health and Human Services, and occupying said parcel as his or her primary residence ("SSDI Exemption").

Exemptions may be granted based on a one-time application and exemptions granted under prior qualified special taxes levied by the District will not require re-approval, subject to the District's right to verify a property owner's continuing qualification for exemption. The District will annually provide to the Tax Collectors or other appropriate County tax officials a list of parcels that the District has approved for exemption.

ACCOUNTABILITY AND COMPLIANCE MEASURES

In accordance with Government Code sections 50075.1 and 50075.3, the following accountability measures, among others, shall apply to the Qualified Special Tax levied in accordance with this Measure:

- 1) Proceeds of the Qualified Special Tax shall be deposited into a fund which shall be kept separate and apart from other funds in the District and shall be applied only as set forth in this Measure.
- 2) An annual report, including the revenues generated by the Qualified Special Tax and the expenditures of these monies and the status of any projects funded by these monies, shall be filed by the chief fiscal officer of the District with the Board no later than January 1 of the year following the fiscal year during which the monies were expended.
- 3) The Board shall provide for the creation of an independent oversight committee to oversee expenditure of the funds collected pursuant to the Measure to ensure that moneys raised under this Measure are spent only for the purposes described in this Measure. The Board shall provide for the composition, duties, and other necessary information regarding the committee's formation and operation. The Board shall have the option to extend any current oversight committee and its membership to serve as the oversight committee for this Measure.

PROTECTION OF FUNDING

Current law forbids any decrease in State or Federal funding to the District because of the District's adoption of a qualified special tax. However, if any such funds are reduced because of the adoption of this qualified special tax, then the amount of the qualified special tax will be reduced annually as necessary in order to restore such State or Federal funding.

APPROPRIATIONS LIMIT

Pursuant to California Constitution Article XIII B and applicable laws, the appropriations limit for the District will be adjusted periodically by the aggregate sum collected by levy of this qualified special tax. This provision shall be deemed to be declaratory of existing procedures governing District expenditures.

SEVERABILITY

The Board hereby declares, and the voters by approving this measure concur, that every section, paragraph, sentence and clause of this measure has independent value, and the Board and the voters would have adopted each provision hereof regardless of every other provision hereof. Upon approval of this measure by the voters, should any part be found by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid for any reason, all remaining parts hereof shall remain in full force and effect to the fullest extent allowed by law.

ARGUMENT AGAINST MEASURE P

Opposition to Measure P

Tahoe Truckee families deserve excellent schools-and they deserve transparency, accountability, and responsible stewardship of taxpayer dollars.

Measure P is described as a renewal, but it also raises the existing parcel tax from \$148 to \$188 per parcel, authorizes automatic annual inflation increases, and extends the tax for another nine years.

The district's own documents acknowledge that the current Measure AA parcel tax remains in effect through the 2027-2028 fiscal year if Measure P is not approved. Voters should ask why they are being asked to approve a higher tax years before the current one expires.

Measure P is projected to generate approximately \$7 million annually, yet the district states that failing to renew the tax would require "over \$5 million" in budget reductions. Taxpayers deserve a detailed explanation of the difference and a clear, public spending plan before being asked to approve millions in additional revenue.

The measure permits spending across numerous broad categories, including academic programs, technology, equipment, counseling, libraries, arts, and other services, but it does not establish binding funding levels or measurable performance goals for any of them.

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE P

Measure P (the “Measure”), if approved by two-thirds of the voters voting thereon, would authorize the levy of a special tax at the rate of \$188 per parcel per year within Tahoe Truckee Unified School District (the “District”). This Measure was placed on the ballot by the Board of Trustees of the District pursuant to Resolution No. 33-2025-2026, which was passed at an official meeting of the Board of Trustees on June 24, 2026.

In November 2018, the voters of the District approved Measure AA. Measure AA imposed a special tax in the amount of \$148 on all parcels of real property within the District for a nine-year period. Measure AA will expire in July of 2028, and the District is proposing this measure in its place. This measure would authorize the District to levy a special parcel tax of \$188 on each taxable parcel within the District for a period of nine years, beginning July 1, 2027. Revenue from the tax can be used only for the purposes specified in the measure. Those purposes include funding academic programs; career technical education; classroom equipment and instructional supplies; technology equipment, services, and curriculum; physical education; visual and performing arts; library services; and student counseling, nursing, and social-emotional support services. The measure estimates that the tax would generate approximately \$7 million annually, although actual revenues would vary based upon the number of taxable parcels and the annual inflation adjustment. The amount of the special tax may be adjusted annually in accordance with the Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers, not to exceed 3% annually. If the Measure is not approved, the Measure AA tax will continue to be collected according to its existing terms.

The Measure provides exemptions from the tax for qualifying property owners who are at least 65 years of age, persons receiving Supplemental Security Income due to disability, and qualifying recipients of Social Security Disability Insurance benefits meeting the income and residency requirements specified in the Measure.

The Measure requires that proceeds of the special tax be deposited into a separate account and used only for the purposes specified in the Measure. The Measure also requires preparation of an annual report accounting for the revenues collected and expenditures made from the special tax, as well as creation of an independent oversight committee.

A “YES” vote is a vote to authorize the levy of the annual special tax in an amount of \$188 per parcel, as provided in the Measure.

A “NO” vote is a vote against the levy of the annual special parcel tax.

RESOLUTION NO. 2026-06-1 OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE COUNTY OF EL DORADO

**A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING AN ELECTION TO INCREASE
THE SPECIAL PARCEL TAX PREVIOUSLY APPROVED BY THE VOTERS
OF THE DISTRICT TO FINANCE ROAD MAINTENANCE SERVICES**

WHEREAS, the Showcase Ranches Community Services District (the "District") is authorized by California Government Code Section 61000 et seq., to provide road, dam, and levee maintenance services within the jurisdictional boundaries; and

WHEREAS, the voters of the District approved in a special election dated April 10 of 1984 a special parcel tax in the amount of \$125.00 per year per parcel to fund road, dam and levee maintenance services; and

WHEREAS, since implementation of the road, dam and levee maintenance special tax in 1984, the expenses of providing adequate maintenance services exceed revenue generated by the existing special tax; and

WHEREAS, the District Board of Directors finds that the District cannot continue to fund road, dam and levee maintenance expenses from its existing financial resources and that an increase in the special tax is required to maintain an adequate level of these maintenance services to District residents; and

WHEREAS, California Government Code Section 53720 through 53730, 53739, and 50075 et seq., authorize the imposition of a special tax by a local agency after voter approval pursuant to Article XIII.C and XIII.D of the California Constitution; and

WHEREAS, the District Board of Directors proposes that the special tax approved by voters on April 10, 1984 be increased to the special tax at the rate of \$250.00 per year per parcel; except that in the cases in which more than one parcel is under common ownership, the new special tax shall only be levied on each additional parcel which is improved with a dwelling; and

WHEREAS, the District Board of Directors proposes that such new special tax be submitted for voter approval by means of a mail ballot pursuant to Government Code Section 61008(c) and Elections Code Section 4000, et seq.; and

WHEREAS, if the increase in the special tax for road, dam and levee maintenance purposes is not approved by two-thirds of the voters casting ballots in the special mail ballot election, the existing road maintenance special tax enacted by the voters on April 10, 1984 shall remain in full force and effect.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Directors of the Showcase Ranches Community Services District that the following Measure be placed on the ballot for vote in a General Election to be held on November 3, 2026 for a special parcel tax to be collected in the same manner and at the same time as ad valorem property taxes are collected by the County of El Dorado, Auditor–Controller–Tax Collector commencing in Fiscal Year 2026-2027.

"Shall the measure to levy an annual special tax in the amount of \$250.00 per year per parcel within the Showcase Ranches Community Services District commencing in FY 2026-2027 and continuing for an unlimited duration, to be used only for road and dam maintenance services and generating an annual revenue of approximately \$37,750, to replace the current special tax of \$125.00, be adopted?"

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE Q

Measure Q (the "Measure"), if approved by two-thirds of the voters voting thereon, would authorize the levy of an increased special parcel tax at the rate of \$250 per parcel per year within the Showcase Ranches Community Services District (the "District"). This Measure was placed on the ballot by the Board of Directors of the District pursuant to Resolution No. 2026-06-1, which was passed at an official meeting of the Board of Directors on June 25, 2026.

If approved, the increased special parcel tax authorized by this Measure will be used solely for the purpose of road and dam maintenance services within the District. The special parcel tax authorized by this Measure would remain in effect until modified or repealed by the voters. The special parcel tax authorized by this Measure is expected to generate revenue of approximately \$37,750 per year. If the Measure is approved, the special parcel tax would replace an existing special tax of \$125 per parcel. If the Measure is not approved, the existing special tax of \$125 per parcel will remain in effect.

State law requires the proceeds from the special tax be applied only to the identified purposes and that an annual report be made indicating the amount of funds collected and expended and the status of any project required or authorized to be funded by the proceeds.

The special tax authorized by this Measure will be listed as a separate item on the county property tax bill for each affected parcel of land and will be collected in the same manner as the general property tax. All laws applicable to the levy, collection, and enforcement of county property taxes, including the provisions for penalties and the procedures for sale of the property in case of delinquency, shall also apply to the special tax.

A "YES" vote is a vote to authorize the levy of the increased annual special tax in an amount of \$250 per parcel, as provided in the Measure.

A "NO" vote is a vote against the levy of the increased annual special tax.

RESOLUTION NO. 2026-06

GOLDEN WEST COMMUNITY SERVICES DISTRICT

A Resolution to Call a Ballot Measure to a Vote of the District on
November 3, 2026

WHEREAS, Section 53722 of the Government Code provides that no local government or district may impose any special tax unless and until such special tax is submitted to the electorate of the local government, or district and approved by a two-thirds vote of the voters voting in an election on the issue, and,

WHEREAS, the electorate of the District approved, by a vote of 217 ("yes") to 14 ("no"), a Special Tax in the amount of \$120 per year per parcel to fund road maintenance activities in an election held on August 7, 1984, and,

WHEREAS, the Special Tax amount has not been increased since its approval in 1984, and,

WHEREAS, the costs of road maintenance materiel and services have increased significantly since 1984;

NOW THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED, that the Golden West Community Services District Board of Directors approves calling a Ballot Measure to a vote of the District electorate in the Gubernatorial General Election on November 3, 2026, and that the said Ballot Measure shall read as presented in Attachment 1 hereto, and,

IT IS FURTHER RESOLVED that this Resolution supersedes Resolution 2026-05 in all manner of form, substance, effect, weight and authority, and,

IT IS FURTHER RESOLVED that the District President and Secretary comply with requirements set forth on the Measure Calendar provided by Elections Department of the County of El Dorado for the General Election to be held on November 3, 2026.

"Shall the measure to enact an annual Special Tax in the amount of \$300.00, adjusted annually per the Engineering News Record Construction Cost Index, on each parcel of land within the Golden West Community Services District, commencing fiscal year 2027-2028 and continuing for an unlimited duration, to be used only for road maintenance and improvements and generating an annual revenue of approximately \$135,300.00, to replace the current Special Tax of \$120.00, be adopted?"

ARGUMENT IN FAVOR OF MEASURE R

In 1984, residents of our Golden West Community Services District voted to levy a Special Tax of \$120 per year on each parcel to maintain and improve our District's public roads. Over the years, we have used those revenues to provide safe, well-maintained roadways for our community. While we have succeeded so far – witness the superior condition of our roads relative to local roads maintained by the County – we face two major challenges from costs that have increased dramatically since 2020.

First, the \$120 annual Special Tax buys much less roadway than when it was passed in 1984. Our 2020 asphalt re-paving project cost \$35 per foot of roadway. Today, the cost is \$94 per foot. That's an average 18% increase per year, compared to the general inflation rate of about 4.3%!

Second, deferred maintenance means higher costs in the future. If costs and revenues continue on their present trajectories, our next major project – resurfacing District roads on the east side of Highway 49 – is project to be completed in 2042 at a cost of \$2.5 million. If this Measure passes, completion advances to 2035 at a cost of \$1.7 million. If this Measure passes AND inflation comes down, completion can occur even earlier at even lower cost.

A vote for this measure will save us time and money (at least 7 years and ¾ million dollars), keep our roads on both sides of Highway 49 in good condition, and allow us to devote more effort, sooner, to renewing private-road encroachments and replacing aging drainage facilities.

A vote against this measure will delay our road and drainage work, allow the condition of our roads to deteriorate, and result in higher costs to repair and maintain them.

RESOLUTION NO. 124-2026

OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE COUNTY OF EL DORADO

EXHIBIT A

The people of the County of El Dorado ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. TITLE.

This measure shall be known as: "The El Dorado County Emergency Preparedness, Healthcare Access, and Wildfire Prevention Initiative."

SECTION 2. FINDINGS.

The people of the County of El Dorado hereby find and declare the following:

1. To keep the residents and communities of El Dorado County safe and healthy, we must do more to prepare for emergencies by ensuring rapid 9-1-1 emergency response, preserving access to emergency rooms and quality healthcare services, and reducing the risk of wildfires in our communities.
2. In emergencies like heart attacks, strokes, and accidents, seconds can be the difference between life and death. Preserving rapid 9-1-1 emergency response and quick access to the nearest emergency room and healthcare facility will save lives.
3. In El Dorado County, lifesaving emergency preparedness and response is provided by an integrated and inseparable continuum of services that starts with the volunteers and professionals who help plan for, mitigate and prevent disasters, continues with the firefighters and paramedics who respond to emergencies and transport patients to local emergency rooms which provide life-saving medical care in emergencies, enabling patients to live healthy and productive lives.
4. With nearly 200,000 residents across 2,000 square miles and as a major tourist destination attracting visitors year-round, El Dorado County's health care facilities, which serve both residents and visitors, are aging, outdated, and in need of upgrades to continue operations.
5. By law, all hospitals and medical facilities that provide emergency care must meet stringent building safety standards by 2030 - just a few years from now. Any hospitals that do not meet these standards by the deadline will be forced to close. The hospitals located in El Dorado County do not currently meet required building safety standards and could be forced to close.
6. Emergency medical care and technologies are advancing rapidly, and local doctors, nurses, specialists, paramedics, and firefighters need access to the latest advances in medicine and treatments for heart attacks, strokes, injuries, cancer, and other diseases.
7. Wildfires are growing faster, deadlier, and more common. Reducing wildfire risk by removing fire hazards, providing early and reliable emergency fire alerts and communications, and planning fast and safe evacuation routes are more important than ever.
8. Local fire protection districts that provide rapid 9-1-1 emergency medical response and firefighting are underfunded and have experienced cuts. Without stable, locally-controlled funding to support local fire districts, rapid emergency response times will increase, endangering the health and safety of El Dorado County residents.

9. With the growing threat of wildfire to properties in El Dorado County, homeowners and property insurance are becoming more expensive and difficult to secure. Investing in wildfire prevention and ensuring adequate numbers of firefighters are available to provide local fire protection will help stabilize the cost and availability of homeowners and property insurance for local residents and businesses.

10. Approximately 80% of 9-1-1 emergency calls in El Dorado County are for medical emergencies like heart attacks, strokes, and accidents that require rapid response and often require patients to be transported to the nearest hospital emergency room.

11. Many areas of El Dorado County can easily be cut-off from outside help during major fires, earthquakes, storms, or other disasters. Having local access to emergency medical care, emergency rooms with reasonable wait times, medical clinics, and a full-service hospital is critical for residents to receive medical care during emergencies.

12. Protecting the community's health and safety requires a strong and integrated continuum of services, including disaster prevention, emergency planning, rapid emergency response, and access to emergency rooms and healthcare facilities. Local healthcare leaders have worked with public safety and fire officials to develop a comprehensive plan to strengthen El Dorado County's emergency preparedness system.

13. To keep El Dorado County healthy and safe, a stable source of locally-controlled revenue is needed to ensure rapid 9-1-1 emergency response, improve access to emergency medical care and other healthcare, and develop a strong wildfire prevention program.

14. As a tourist destination and major transportation corridor, visitors to El Dorado County pay a significant portion of the local sales tax revenue collected. A 3/8 of one percent increase in the local sales tax rate will provide over \$12 million annually in reliable, local revenue to prepare for emergencies while minimizing the cost to local residents.

15. For these reasons, the voters of El Dorado County seek to enact a 3/8 of one percent transactions and use tax, known more commonly as a sales tax, to provide stable, locally-controlled revenue exclusively for emergency preparedness by ensuring rapid 9-1-1 emergency response, preserving access to emergency rooms and quality healthcare services, and reducing the risk of wildfires in El Dorado County.

16. All funds from this measure would be used and controlled locally for emergency preparedness, healthcare access, and wildfire prevention and suppression only. No funds from the measure could be taken away or redirected by the county, state, or federal governments.

17. To ensure funds from the measure are used as promised, an independent oversight committee comprised of El Dorado County residents would oversee the use of funds and report their findings to the community.

SECTION 3. PURPOSE AND INTENT.

In enacting the El Dorado County Emergency Preparedness, Healthcare Access, and Wildfire Prevention Initiative, it is the purpose and intent of the people of El Dorado County to prepare for emergencies and keep residents of the community healthy and safe by:

1. Protecting rapid 9-1-1 emergency response to fires, accidents, and medical emergencies;
2. Maintaining access to emergency rooms in close proximity to the population and with reasonable wait times;

3. Providing up-to-date medical facilities with highly qualified doctors, nurses, specialists, medical equipment, technology, and treatments for heart attacks, strokes, cancer, and other healthcare needs;
4. Providing safe and updated intensive care, trauma care, urgent care, operating rooms, labs, and imaging facilities throughout the County that meet current medical and building safety standards;
5. Improving wildfire prevention and protection, including removing fire hazards, establishing fire-safe evacuation routes, and establishing early emergency alerts and reliable emergency communication systems;
6. Establishing a 3/8 of one percent special local sales tax for 30 years to be paid by visitors and residents shopping in El Dorado County and expressly limiting the use of funds from this measure to ensuring rapid 9-1-1 emergency response, preserving access to emergency rooms and quality healthcare services, and reducing the risk of wildfires;
7. Requiring that funds generated by this measure will be audited annually and overseen by an independent citizens' oversight committee to ensure that all funds are spent in accordance with the terms of this measure and for the exclusive purpose of preparing for emergencies and keeping residents of the community healthy and safe; and
8. Requiring that the independent citizens' oversight committee shall meet regularly and report their findings to the public.

SECTION 4. THE EL DORADO COUNTY EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS, HEALTHCARE ACCESS, AND WILDFIRE PREVENTION INITIATIVE.

Chapter 3.42 of Title 3 is hereby added to the El Dorado County Ordinance Code to read as follows:

Chapter 3.42. The El Dorado County Emergency Preparedness, Healthcare Access, and Wildfire Prevention Initiative.

3.42.010. Title.

This Chapter shall be known as "The El Dorado County Emergency Preparedness, Healthcare Access, and Wildfire Prevention Initiative"

3.42.020. Definitions.

"Board of Supervisors" means the El Dorado County Board of Supervisors.

"Committee" means the Independent Citizens' Oversight Committee established in Section 3.42.200.

"County" means the County of El Dorado.

"District" means the County of El Dorado.

"Fund" means the El Dorado County Emergency Preparedness, Healthcare Access, and Wildfire Prevention Initiative Fund established in Section 3.42.040.

"Local hospital" means a general acute care hospital, as defined in subdivision (a) of Section 1250 of the Health and Safety Code, that, as of January 1, 2025, was both located within the geographic boundaries of the County and licensed to operate at least 100 general acute care beds under Division 5 of Title 22 of the California Code of Regulations.

"Operative Date" means the first day of the first calendar quarter commencing more than 110 days after the adoption of this ordinance.

"Ordinance" means The El Dorado County Emergency Preparedness, Healthcare Access, and Wildfire Prevention Initiative.

3.42.030. Purpose.

This ordinance is adopted to achieve the following purposes, and directs that the provisions hereof be interpreted to accomplish those purposes:

A. To impose a retail transactions and use tax in accordance with the provisions of Part 1.6 (commencing with Section 7251) of Division 2 of, and Section 7285.5 of, the Revenue and Taxation Code.

B. To adopt a retail transactions and use tax ordinance that incorporates provisions identical to those of the Sales and Use Tax Law of the State of California insofar as those provisions are not inconsistent with the requirements and limitations contained in Part 1.6 (commencing with Section 7251) of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code.

C. To adopt a retail transactions and use tax ordinance that imposes a tax and provides a measure therefor that can be administered and collected by the California Department of Tax and Fee Administration in a manner that adapts itself as fully as practicable to, and requires the least possible deviation from, the existing statutory and administrative procedures followed by the California Department of Tax and Fee Administration in administering and collecting the California State Sales and Use Taxes.

D. To adopt a retail transactions and use tax ordinance that can be administered in a manner that will be, to the greatest degree possible, consistent with the provisions of Part 1.6 (commencing with Section 7251) of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, minimizes the cost of collecting the transactions and use taxes, and at the same time, minimizes the burden of record keeping upon persons subject to taxation under the provisions of this ordinance.

E. To protect public health and safety by ensuring rapid 9-1-1 response to fires, accidents, and medical emergencies; maintaining timely access to nearby emergency rooms and quality healthcare services; providing for modern medical facilities, equipment, and specialists to treat critical conditions; and keeping intensive care, trauma care, and other hospital and healthcare system infrastructure up to date and safe by:

1. Appropriating revenues to support the efforts of eligible local hospitals to secure funding for the purposes of providing up-to-date medical facilities and safe and updated intensive care, trauma care, urgent care, operating rooms, laboratories, clinics, and imaging facilities that meet current medical and building safety standards;

2. Appropriating revenues for local 9-1-1 emergency medical response, disaster response, and fire suppression by supporting local fire districts and fire departments;

3. Appropriating revenues for local fire protection to strengthen wildfire prevention through hazard removal, fire-safe evacuation routes, early alerts, and reliable emergency communications; and

4. Requiring annual audits and oversight by an independent citizens' oversight committee to ensure funds are used exclusively for these purposes.

3.42.040. The El Dorado County Emergency Preparedness, Healthcare Access, and Wildfire Prevention Initiative Fund.

There is hereby established in the treasury of the County a special fund called the El Dorado County Emergency Preparedness, Healthcare Access, and Wildfire Prevention Initiative Fund, which shall be maintained by the County.

3.42.050. Receipt of Proceeds.

A. All revenue generated by this ordinance shall be deposited into the Fund and shall exclusively be used in the County for the purposes described in this Chapter.

B. Monies in the Fund shall be used to reimburse the County for the actual costs imposed by the California Department of Tax and Fee Administration to administer and operate this tax pursuant to Section 3.42.080 and for use for the Annual Independent Audit pursuant to Section 3.42.190.

C. The remaining monies in the Fund shall be expended pursuant to and subject to the requirements set forth in Section 3.42.060.

3.42.060. Use of Proceeds.

A. In each fiscal year, after funding has been set aside for the purposes of subsection B of Section 3.42.050, the Board of Supervisors shall appropriate the remaining monies in the Fund pursuant to this section.

B. In the first full fiscal year after the operative date of this ordinance, the Board of Supervisors shall appropriate the revenue in the Fund as follows:

1. Fifty percent to eligible local hospitals for the purpose of providing up-to-date medical facilities and safe and updated intensive care, trauma care, urgent care, operating rooms, laboratories, clinics and imaging facilities that meet current medical and building safety standards to enhance preparedness for emergencies and preserve access to an emergency room and quality healthcare services.

2. Five percent to the local non-profit organizations specified in paragraph 1 of subsection D.

3. Forty-five percent to fire departments and agencies, allocated pursuant to the percentages specified in paragraph 2 of subsection D.

C. In every fiscal year after the first full fiscal year after the operative date of this ordinance, the Board of Supervisors shall appropriate the revenue in the Fund to eligible local hospitals on October 15 and April 15 for the purpose of providing for payment of debt service on the eligible local hospital's bonds or other debt obligations, incurred to provide up-to-date medical facilities and safe and updated intensive care, trauma care, urgent care, operating rooms, laboratories, clinics, and imaging facilities that meet current medical and building safety standards, in such amounts as are necessary to maintain a minimum debt service coverage ratio of 1.5.

1. An eligible local hospital may pledge and assign all or a portion of the payments under the appropriation in this subsection directly to a bond trustee for the payment of principal, premiums, if any, and interest under any loan agreement entered into for the purposes enumerated in this subsection.

2. Any change of ownership of an eligible local hospital shall not affect an appropriation under this subsection made to the eligible local hospital.

3. The funds appropriated in this subsection shall only be used to pay debt service on, or otherwise support, bonds or other debt obligations of an eligible local hospital issued for capital projects consistent with the purposes specified in this subsection, which shall include but not be limited to, planning, design, permitting, fees, inspection, project management, construction, equipment, and all other costs related to the completion of the capital projects, that in the aggregate total to not more than one hundred twenty-five million dollars during the term of this ordinance.

4. No later than 30 days after the appropriations to eligible local hospitals under this subsection, any surplus funds not utilized by an eligible local hospital or a bond trustee after the payment of debt service specified in paragraph 3 shall be remitted to the Fund and shall be immediately available for allocation in accordance with subsection D.

D. The remaining monies in the Fund shall be allocated as follows:

1. Five percent of the total revenue in the Fund calculated before the appropriation in subsection C shall be allocated to local non-profit organizations located and operating in the County as of January 1, 2025, that assist and educate local homeowners and property owners on reducing the risk of wildfire and protecting their homes and properties from wildfire through vegetation management, maintaining defensible spaces around properties, home hardening, planning and preparing for evacuations, implementing early emergency alerts and communications, and other proven strategies to reduce wildfire risk, protect property, and reduce the loss of life from wildfires.

2. After the monies in paragraph 1 are allocated, the remaining amount in the Fund shall be allocated to the fire departments and agencies identified below in the specified proportions, which are reflective of the proportional number of full-time fire engines in the County operated by each department or agency as of November 2025. In the event that an entity consolidates with or is annexed by another entity, the successor agency shall receive the funds previously allocated to the absorbed or annexed entity, apportioned based on service to residents of the County. These funds shall be allocated as follows:

3.42.070. Maintenance of Effort.

Monies from the Fund may not be used to replace or otherwise supplant the tax revenue funding and other county funding and payments currently provided or otherwise available to support the eligible local hospital or fire departments and agencies.

3.42.080. Contract with State.

Prior to the operative date of this Chapter, the County shall contract with the California Department of Tax and Fee Administration to perform all functions incident to the administration and operation of this transactions and use tax ordinance, provided that, if the County shall not have contracted with the California Department of Tax and Fee Administration prior to the operative date of this Chapter, it shall nevertheless so contract and in such a case the operative date of this Chapter shall be the first day of the first calendar quarter following the execution of such a contract.

3.42.090. Transactions Tax Rate.

For the privilege of selling tangible personal property at retail, a tax is hereby imposed upon all retailers in the incorporated and unincorporated territory of the District at the rate of 0.375% of the gross receipts of any retailer from the sale of all tangible personal property sold at retail in said territory on and after the operative date of this ordinance.

3.42.100. Place Of Sale.

For the purposes of this ordinance, all retail sales are consummated at the place of business of the retailer unless the tangible personal property sold is delivered by the retailer or his agent to an out-of-state destination or to a common carrier for delivery to an out-of-state destination. The gross receipts from such sales shall include delivery charges, when such charges are subject to the state sales and use tax, regardless of the place to which delivery is made. In the event a retailer has no permanent place of business in the State or has more than one place of business, the place or places at which the retail sales are consummated shall be determined under rules and regulations to be prescribed and adopted by the California Department of Tax and Fee Administration.

3.42.110. Use Tax Rate.

An excise tax is hereby imposed on the storage, use or other consumption in the District of tangible personal property purchased from any retailer on and after the operative date of this ordinance for storage, use or other consumption in said territory at the rate of 0.375% of the sales price of the property. The sales price shall include delivery charges when such charges are subject to state sales or use tax regardless of the place to which delivery is made.

3.42.120. Adoption Of Provisions Of State Law.

Except as otherwise provided in this ordinance and except insofar as they are inconsistent with the provisions of Part 1.6 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, all of the provisions of Part 1 (commencing with Section 6001) of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code are hereby adopted and made a part of this ordinance as though fully set forth herein.

3.42.130. Limitations On Adoption Of State Law And Collection Of Use Taxes.

In adopting the provisions of Part 1 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code:

A. Wherever the State of California is named or referred to as the taxing agency, the name of this County shall be substituted therefor. However, the substitution shall not be made when:

1. The word "State" is used as a part of the title of the State Controller, State Treasurer, State Treasury, or the Constitution of the State of California.

2. The result of that substitution would require action to be taken by or against this County or any agency, officer, or employee thereof rather than by or against the California Department of Tax and Fee Administration, in performing the functions incident to the administration or operation of this ordinance.

3. In those sections, including, but not limited to, sections referring to the exterior boundaries of the State of California, where the result of the substitution would be to:

a. Provide an exemption from this tax with respect to certain sales, storage, use, or other consumption of tangible personal property which would not otherwise be exempt from this tax while such sales, storage, use, or other consumption remain subject to tax by the State under the provisions of Part 1 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code; or

b. Impose this tax with respect to certain sales, storage, use, or other consumption of tangible personal property which would not be subject to tax by the state under the said provision of that code.

4. In Sections 6701, 6702 (except in the last sentence thereof), 6711, 6715, 6737, 6797 or 6828 of the Revenue and Taxation Code.

B. The word "District" shall be substituted for the word "State" in the phrase "retailer engaged in business in this State" in Section 6203 and in the definition of that phrase in Section 6203.

1. "A retailer engaged in business in the County" shall also include any retailer that, in the preceding calendar year or the current calendar year, has total combined sales of tangible personal property in this state or for delivery in the State by the retailer and all persons related to the retailer that exceeds five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000). For purposes of this section, a person is related to another person if both persons are related to each other pursuant to Section 267(b) of Title 26 of the United States Code and the regulations thereunder.

3.42.140. Permit Not Required.

If a seller's permit has been issued to a retailer under Section 6067 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, an additional transactor's permit shall not be required by this ordinance.

3.42.150. Exemptions And Exclusions.

A. There shall be excluded from the measure of the transactions tax and the use tax the amount of any sales tax or use tax imposed by the State of California or by any city, city and county, or county pursuant to the Bradley-Burns Uniform Local Sales and Use Tax Law or the amount of any state-administered transactions or use tax.

B. There are exempted from the computation of the amount of transactions tax the gross receipts from:

1. Sales of tangible personal property, other than fuel or petroleum products, to operators of aircraft to be used or consumed principally outside the County in which the sale is made and directly and exclusively in the use of such aircraft as common carriers of persons or property under the authority of the laws of this State, the United States, or any foreign government.

2. Sales of property to be used outside the District that is shipped to a point outside the District, pursuant to the contract of sale, by delivery to such point by the retailer or his agent, or by delivery by the retailer to a carrier for shipment to a consignee at such point. For the purposes of this paragraph, delivery to a point outside the District shall be satisfied:

a. With respect to vehicles (other than commercial vehicles) subject to registration pursuant to Chapter I (commencing with Section 4000) of Division 3 of the Vehicle Code, aircraft licensed in compliance with Section 21411 of the Public Utilities Code, and undocumented vessels registered under Division 3.5 (commencing with Section 9840) of the Vehicle Code by registration to an out-of-District address and by a declaration under penalty of perjury, signed by the buyer, stating that such address is, in fact, his or her principal place of residence; and

b. With respect to commercial vehicles, by registration to a place of business out-of-District and declaration under penalty of perjury, signed by the buyer, that the vehicle will be operated from that address.

3. The sale of tangible personal property if the seller is obligated to furnish the property for a fixed price pursuant to a contract entered into prior to the operative date of this ordinance.

4. A lease of tangible personal property which is a continuing sale of such property, for any period of time for which the lessor is obligated to lease the property for an amount fixed by the lease prior to the operative date of this ordinance.

5. For the purposes of subparagraphs (3) and (4) of this section, the sale or lease of tangible personal property shall be deemed not to be obligated pursuant to a contract or lease for any period of time for which any party to the contract or lease has the unconditional right to terminate the contract or lease upon notice, whether or not such right is exercised.

C. There are exempted from the use tax imposed by this ordinance, the storage, use or other consumption in this County of tangible personal property:

1. The gross receipts from the sale of which have been subject to a transactions tax under any state-administered transactions and use tax ordinance.

2. Other than fuel or petroleum products purchased by operators of aircraft and used or consumed by such operators directly and exclusively in the use of such aircraft as common carriers of persons or property for hire or compensation under a certificate of public convenience and necessity issued pursuant to the laws of this State, the United States, or any foreign government. This exemption is in addition to the exemptions provided in Sections 6366 and 6366.1 of the Revenue and Taxation Code of the State of California.

3. If the purchaser is obligated to purchase the property for a fixed price pursuant to a contract entered into prior to the operative date of this ordinance.

4. If the possession of, or the exercise of any right or power over, the tangible personal property arises under a lease which is a continuing purchase of such property for any period of time for which the lessee is obligated to lease the property for an amount fixed by a lease prior to the operative date of this ordinance.

5. For the purposes of subparagraphs (3) and (4) of this section, storage, use, or other consumption, or possession of, or exercise of any right or power over, tangible personal property shall be deemed not to be obligated pursuant to a contract or lease for any period of time for which any party to the contract or lease has the unconditional right to terminate the contract or lease upon notice, whether or not such right is exercised.

6. Except as provided in subparagraph (7), a retailer engaged in business in the District shall not be required to collect use tax from the purchaser of tangible personal property, unless the retailer ships or delivers the property into the District or participates within the District in making the sale of the property, including, but not limited to, soliciting or receiving the order, either directly or indirectly, at a place of business of the retailer in the district or through any representative, agent, canvasser, solicitor, subsidiary, or person in the District under the authority of the retailer.

7. "A retailer engaged in business in the District" shall also include any retailer of any of the following: vehicles subject to registration pursuant to Chapter 1 (commencing with Section 4000) of Division 3 of the Vehicle Code, aircraft licensed in compliance with Section 21411 of the Public Utilities Code, or undocumented vessels registered under Division 3.5 (commencing with Section 9840) of the Vehicle Code. That retailer shall be required to collect use tax from any purchaser who registers or licenses the vehicle, vessel, or aircraft at an address in the District.

D. Any person subject to use tax under this ordinance may credit against that tax any transactions tax or reimbursement for transactions tax paid to a district imposing, or retailer liable for a transactions tax pursuant to Part 1.6 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code with respect to the sale to the person of the property the storage, use, or other consumption of which is subject to the use tax.

3.42.160. Amendments.

All amendments subsequent to the effective date of this ordinance to Part I of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code relating to sales and use taxes and which are not inconsistent with Part 1.6 and Part 1.7 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, and all amendments to Part 1.6 and Part 1.7 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, shall automatically become a part of this ordinance, provided however, that no such amendment shall operate so as to affect the rate of tax imposed by this ordinance.

3.42.170. Enjoining Collection Forbidden.

No injunction or writ of mandate or other legal or equitable process shall issue in any suit, action, or proceeding in any court against the State or the County, or against any officer of the State or the County, to prevent or enjoin the collection under this ordinance, or Part 1.6 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, of any tax or any amount of tax required to be collected.

3.42.180 Termination of Transactions and Use Tax.

This Chapter shall remain operative for 30 years from the operative date of this ordinance and shall be repealed by operation of this section on that date, unless a later measure is adopted before that date which deletes or extends the termination date.

3.42.190 Annual Independent Audit.

The proceeds of the tax imposed by this ordinance, as well as the expenditures from the Fund, shall be subject to the same independent annual audit requirements as other revenues in the County. An independent auditor's report may be funded by the revenues from the Fund and shall include an accounting of the revenues received and expenditures made from the Fund and shall be presented annually to the Board of Supervisors and made available for public review. The report of such audit shall be posted on the County's website.

3.42.200**Independent Citizens' Oversight Committee.**

A. The Board of Supervisors shall, by resolution adopted before the operative date of this ordinance, establish a seven-member Independent Citizens' Oversight Committee to review the revenue and expenditure of funds from the El Dorado County Emergency Preparedness, Healthcare Access and Wildfire Prevention Initiative Fund from the prior fiscal year to assure the funds were expended consistent with the requirements of this Chapter. The Board of Supervisors shall appoint members to the Independent Citizens' Oversight Committee no later than 45 days after the effective date of this ordinance.

B. The Independent Citizens' Oversight Committee shall be composed of seven at-large, voting members with the characteristics described below. Members of the committee shall not simultaneously hold any elected office and shall be residents of El Dorado County at their time of appointment.

1. A professional in the field of municipal or public finance and/or budgeting with a minimum of five years in a relevant and senior decision-making position in the public or private sector.

2. Two members who are current or former fire chiefs, senior fire officers, or representatives of recognized local firefighters' associations or professional organizations, each with at least five years in fire suppression, prevention, or emergency medical response.

3. Two members with at least five years of experience in disaster preparedness, emergency planning, public safety coordination, law enforcement, or emergency communications.

4. Two members who are senior administrators or licensed health professionals (e.g., physicians, nurses, allied health professionals) with at least five years in hospital operations, emergency medicine, trauma care, or related acute-care specialties.

C. All meetings of the Committee shall be open to the public and shall comply with the provisions of the Ralph M. Brown Act, codified at California Government Code Section 54950 et seq.

D. The Committee shall review the Annual Independent Audit prepared pursuant to Section 3.42.190 and shall prepare an annual report to be presented and reviewed by the Board of Supervisors at a Board of Supervisors meeting. The report should include an assessment of the consistency of the expenditures of the Fund from the prior fiscal year with the ordinance. The report shall be available to the public.

SECTION 5. AMENDMENT.

The measure may not be amended by the Board of Supervisors without voter approval.

SECTION 6. EFFECTIVE DATE.

The measure shall take effect ten days after the certification by the Board of Supervisors of the election results indicating passage of the measure by a majority of the voters casting votes in the election; however, the Operative Date of the tax imposed by this measure shall be the first day of the first calendar quarter commencing more than one hundred ten days after the adoption of this measure.

SECTION 7. SEVERABILITY.

If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase, or word of this measure is for any reason held to be invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this measure. The voters of County of El Dorado hereby declare they would have passed and adopted this measure and each and all provisions hereof irrespective of the fact that any one or more of said provisions be declared invalid.

SECTION 8. LIBERAL CONSTRUCTION.

This measure is an exercise of the initiative power of the People of the County of El Dorado to implement a special tax to fund the purposes set forth in the measure, and it shall be liberally construed to effectuate these purposes.

SECTION 9. CONFLICTING MEASURES.

This measure is intended to be comprehensive. It is the intent of the People of the County of El Dorado that, in the event this measure and one or more measures relating to a special transactions and use tax shall appear on the same ballot, the provisions of the other measure or measures shall be deemed in conflict with this measure. In the event that this measure receives a greater number of affirmative votes, the provisions of this measure shall prevail in their entirety, and all provisions of the other measure or measures shall be null and void.

SECTION 10. APPROPRIATIONS LIMIT.

Pursuant to California Constitution Article XIII B and applicable laws, for four years from the day of the election at which this measure is adopted, the appropriations limit for the County shall be increased by the aggregate sum collected by the levy of the transactions and use tax imposed by this measure.

The ballot question submitted to voters shall be as follows:

“To update hospital facilities, equipment, and technologies and maintain local access to emergency rooms; reduce wildfire risk by supporting local fire protection/prevention such as removing dry brush and other fire hazards; and provide rapid 9-1-1 emergency response to fires, accidents, and medical emergencies, shall the measure enacting a 3/8% sales tax for 30 years in El Dorado County, providing approximately \$13,000,000 annually, with independent oversight, audits, and local control, be adopted?”

ARGUMENT IN FAVOR OF MEASURE S

Vote YES on S to preserve access to emergency rooms and quality healthcare, protect rapid 9-1-1 emergency response, and reduce wildfire risk.

In emergencies like heart attacks, strokes, and accidents, seconds are the difference between life and death. ARGUMENT AGAINST MEASURE S

Measure S is another SALES TAX INCREASE we cannot afford!

Our current County Charter already requires our Board of Supervisors to allocate ½ cent of our already high 7 1/4 cent countywide sales tax for public safety. IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE S

Measure S (the "Measure"), if approved by a majority of the voters voting thereon, would impose a special retail transactions and use tax, commonly referred to as a sales tax, within the County of El Dorado for a period of thirty (30) years at the rate of three-eighths ($3/8$) of one percent. If approved, the tax would apply throughout El Dorado County, including in the cities of Placerville and South Lake Tahoe. All revenue generated by the Measure would be dedicated to the purposes described in the Measure, which include, among other things, updating hospital facilities and equipment, improving emergency preparedness and response, and supporting fire suppression and wildfire prevention activities.

In the first year after the Measure is approved, the Board of Supervisors ("Board") would be required to allocate fifty percent (50%) of the proceeds of the tax to eligible local hospitals, as specifically defined in the Measure, for the purpose of modernizing local hospitals and medical facilities. Additionally, in the first year, forty-five percent (45%) of the proceeds of the tax will be allocated to local fire agencies and five percent (5%) of the proceeds of the tax will be allocated to eligible local non-profit organizations for wildfire prevention and fire services in El Dorado County.

In subsequent years, the Measure requires the Board to allocate tax revenues first to eligible local hospitals for the purpose of providing payment of debt service on bonds or other debt obligations incurred to finance capital projects for updated healthcare facilities. Any remaining tax revenues will then be dedicated to the purposes described in the Measure and allocated as follows. Five percent (5%) of the Measure's tax revenues would be allocated to eligible local nonprofit organizations providing community services that educate and assist County residents with wildfire prevention and protection resources. The remaining tax revenues would be allocated to local fire agencies within the County in specified proportions that are based on the number of full-time fire engines operated by each fire agency. The majority of eligible fire agencies would each receive four percent (4%) of this amount and some fire agencies would each receive twenty percent (20%) of this amount.

The Measure requires the creation of an Independent Citizens' Oversight Committee ("Committee") to review and report on expenditures annually to ensure tax proceeds are appropriated in compliance with the Measure. The Measure also requires annual independent financial audits of revenues and expenditures, which will be reviewed by the Committee and made available to the public.

This Measure was placed on the ballot by a petition signed by the requisite number of voters.

A "YES" vote is a vote to authorize the imposition of a three-eighths ($3/8$) of one percent sales tax within El Dorado County.

A "NO" vote is a vote against the imposition of a three-eighths ($3/8$) of one percent sales tax within El Dorado County.
